THE SPIRIT OF BANJO

THERE'S a murmur in the outback, there's a rumour down the town, There's a stirring in the stockyards as if there's rain around. Heads are turned to Winton, Queensland, for in April '95. That's where you'll catch the spirit of the Banjo, all alive!

Yes folk will flock to Winton, it will be a magic week, They know that somewhere in that time they'll hear the Banjo speak. And already there's a movement, you can feel it in the air, For the spirit of the Banjo is riding everywhere.

Leaving footprints at Royal Randwick, raising dust out in the scrub, Drawing rein outside each schoolhouse, tying up outside each pub. Letting people know that the spirit lives, in spite of all our fears, And Matilda has been proudly Waltzing for one hundred years.

And if our poets feel the spirit, if our singers make the choice, To celebrate our nation in our natural voice, So our children feel the spirit moving in them, then, Australia's heart will beat in Winton as the Banjo rides again.

I travelled to Longreach via Queensland Rail (24 hours) on the train I met a couple of ex-ringers/stockmen, Shorty Rutledge who had turned his hand at saddle making since settling in Brisbane (and what a beautiful saddle he had to show!) also Mervin Wagg who once worked for R.M. Williams at Rockybar. The stories and tales were flying fast. Then we stopped at Rockhampton and were joined by Janet O'Brien Vise and Joe Seeney, who entertained the passengers with selections of poetry.

Arrived at Longreach at 7pm and stayed at Swaggies Backpackers run by John Darcey (great place! a home away from home). Thursday I wandered around town and met a lot of interesting characters till it was time to go back to school with Jim Haynes at Edgley Hall. Jim ran 3 workshops over the weekend and I would not hesitate recommending his classes to anyone wanting to learn more about poetry and songwriting.

Friday night, first of the heats at the Cultural Centre run by NOPA, was a packed house with talent that you wouldn't believe (about 20 or so poets and around 200 in the audience). Saturday morning, classes with Jim Haynes, then the second round of NOPA (again a huge crowd) then onto the Hall Of Fame for dinner, and an impromptu show by Bluey Bostock, Jim Haynes, Bill Hay, John Philipson, Campbell, Charlee Marshall and others to a crowd of ringers and stockmen who, by the applause, really enjoyed the show. It struck me that there was about 200 to 250 men and women there who probably could tell 10 or 20 stories of varying degrees and as they were all between 60 to 90 years old that would amount to about 2,000 to 4,000 stories covering many years of history. For that is what these people represent- History in the making of Aust.

Sunday afternoon we put on Poets at the Pub organised by David Sell from ABC Radio at the Hotel Royal run by Mike and Racheal Tate, mostly compered by 'The Fool from Thangool,' Charlee Marshall (again to a packed audience) then onto the finals at the Cultural Centre.

The Poetry Cup was won by Mark Klienschmidt, 2nd Karen Emmott, 3rd Carolyn White, though all 9 finalists deserve a pat on the back for the high standard of poetry presented. The event was attended by some very honoured guests including Sir James and Lady Walker, Mayor J. Moloney, Dr Johnathon King and many representatives of the media. A big thankyou must go to Jim Haynes who compered all these events, Helen Avery and David Sell, Tim Butler and Ian Tinney for the organisation, also to the ladies of the Arts & Crafts Assoc. Carol Tanks, Susan, Vanessa Dart, Elaine Britton, Rosemary Champion and the Bar Boys & Ringers, An even bigger thanks to the many talented poets from all over the country who attended and performed at Longreach to ensure that this event will be on the calander next year and equal to Tamworth.

CORRYONG: The high country had a inaugural meeting on March 18th. The Jack Riley Heritage award, involved 3 categories. That of song, yarn and poem. Several people entered into the fray, which was compered by Mike Hayes of Prickle Farm fame. The locals were entertained by quite a variety of performance. One local mentioned he'd never seen poetry being performed before. I guess that's what it's all about, bringing material which is entertaining and relevant, to the people. The best song was won by Ken Robertson from Swan Hill. Yarnspinning, Tammy Muir, and Poem Neil Hulm. A top night all round. One word of suggestion to anyone organising this type of event. If you are going to organise such an event with rules such as time limits etc, it's a good idea to stick to them, and Judges really should have their judging criteria worked out carefully. Say no more.

JAMBEROO: My first visit to this festival, even though I grew up at nearby Robertson. A great little country town and a super friendly festival. I had an absolute ball, lots of performing, entered into my first real Yarnspinning competition, still plenty of time to have a natter to Ted Egan, Jim Haines, John Philipson, Frank Daniel, the Brown Clan and a host of other people. I still owe you a beer, John. Young Jeremy Brown won the Poets Brawl. Frank won the Yarnspinning and I scraped in with a second. That upset the locals! Fancy an nonlocal winning that event!

CANBERRA: The National Folk Festival was great for Poetry and a lot of emphasis on Dance and singing. A far different feel to Jamberoo, and a learning experience for me as to the different types of poetry. There is an interesting difference between mainstream Poetry, Folk, Bush, Performance, Political etc. I'm not sure what it is yet but it's interesting. Congratulations to Leigh Brown for picking up the Reciters award at the Poets Dinner and the team effort went to Charlee Marshall & Beryl(Who performed for the first time), Campbell the Swaggie, and Roz Brown who delighted us with real Yankee poetry. The team gets to keep "Macarthers Fart" for the next 12 ments.

MILAWA: The event of the year on the Poets calendar was Noel Cutler's Book Launch. A raging success. Every seat sold, and enough people turned away to have had another night. Ably and admirably compered by Jim Haines(I'm not making this up), the program included Mark Gliori, Bob Miller, John Philipson. Geoffrey Graham, Bill Hay, Marion Fitzgerald, Ray Essery and some bloke called Noel Cutler. What a collection of Ratbags! Congratulations must go to obviously Noel for a brilliantly organised event and to all the other people who assisted in some way, and of course our own "Mum", the matriarch of the poet performers....Judith Hosier. From the moment I ambled into the pub on friday night and spied Noel, Judith, Bob, Sandy, Artie and Billy (He drove trains you know!) I knew it was going to be one hell of a weekend. The thing is I found it hard to get a word in! The Saturday night Book Launch was everything it was meant to be and a lot more. At a quarter past twelve, people still hungered for more. I think they realised they had been witness to a fine collection of performers. The following morning was met with the obligatory Poets breakfast, then a BBQ lunch, and relatively quiet dinner at the pub. Milawa will never be the same.

I keep hearing about this place called Queensland up there somewhere, and I tell you I'll just have to visit the place and see what's cooking. The last time I tried to go there I got stopped and told I wasn't allowed in!

Actually after the Tamworth weekend, Noel and I will be performing at the Kiosk at Brisbane. So if any body else up there wants to employ a couple of Victorian Poets in Mid June, we are open to any offers. We need petrol money for the return trip, otherwise we might stay up there, and I'm sure you wouldn't want that.

Essex Evans

Evans died in 1909 at the age of 46, one of Australia's foremost poets of his time. His monument was paid for by public subscription and erected in 1914.

One of his most popular poems, Women of the West, was recently set to country and western style music. It is reported to be climbing the popular music charts.

These are the words, as Essex Evans wrote them:

THE WOMEN OF THE WEST

They left the vine-wreathed cottage and the mansion on the hill, The houses in the busy streets where life is never still, The pleasures of the city, and the friends they cherished best: For love they faced the wilderness-the Women of the West.

The roar, and rush, and fever of the city died away, And the old-time joys and faces-they were gone for many a day; In their place the lurching coach-wheel, or the creaking bullock chains, O'er the everlasting sameness of the never-ending plains.

In the slab-built, zinc-roofed homestead of some lately-taken run, In the tent beside the bankment of a railway just begun, In the huts on new selections, in the camps of man's unrest, On the frontiers of the Nation, live the Women of the West. DEAR RON.

A FEW YEARS AGO IPENNED THESE LINES IN PROTEST OF THE "KNOCKER"WE SEEM TO FIND IN ANY COLLECTIVE GROUP.

"NOT BEHIND! JUST LATER!

Their rehearsal time and fishing in the Cooper were cut short when the water fell too quickly, leaving muddy banks. Flies and mosquitoes finally drove them out.

At Betoota they recited to an audience of ONE!

Things were different at Birdsville, with a big audience at the Poets Breakfast building up as the day went on.

Bill Hay said there were 300 to 400 attending, including a busload from Winton.




