***** PRESIDENTS REPORT. JUNE 95. *****

As President of A,B.P.A. I do not like to rake over old coals but due to the discussion on Winton in last months magazine I feel an answer to the letters therein need some clarification.

The whole concept was formed by the Winton Festival Committee and at a meeting which included myself, Dr Johnathon King, Tim Butler and the festival director the idea of the Poets Walk was proposed and the culmination of the walk would be in Winton and the Innaugral ABPA Poetry competition for Bush Verse would be held. I offered my services for the promotions of Winton free of charge as I believe in the preservation of our heritage and traditions by way of bush verse. For over ten months I travelled QLD and NSW doing just that, Promoting Waltzing Matilda.

The original agreement was that ABPA would provide our own marquee for the competition, this would also double as accommodation for members, and we would recieve the 'gate' money and pay a percentage to the festival. This was later over-ruled when the QLD Events Corp. became involved and Dr King was dismissed as director and ABPA was offered a mere pittance to conduct the competition in lue of 'Gate' money.

A panel of nine judges was drawn up, most in the entertainment field and being well quallified to be a judge of our talented poets,

In reply to Frank Daniels' letter of last month. Mr Kelly Dixon was one of the first to be approached as a judge, His name and the other judges were named at a meeting in June and it was unanimously approved by all present that these highly qualified people be asked to judge.

On the financial side of Winton, in my opinion 'We were shafted' and should look on it as a learning experience and although as I said up front of this report I do'nt like to rake over old coals and the magazine should not be used to air members differences and hope this is the end of the Winton debate. If any member still not satisfied with the debate would like to phone me or write a letter on the subject I will answer them direct if they forward their letter onto our secretary it will then be passed on to me. I look forward to your replies.

I am curently working on a distribution outlet for poets involving sponsorship for poets and venues Australia wide. Ampol have already shown their support with the cost of fuel, (around \$7,000) for the Swaggie Poets Walk tour of Queensland.

I am also endeavoring to have poetry included in Country Music Festivals and possibly establishing a branch of ABPA here in Cairns. I will be conducting a Poets Breakfast in August at the Australian Rodeo Championships at Rockhampton and hopefully including a competition for poets.

Secretarys' Report.

June already! Another half a year has passed for the Australian Bush Poets Association. The honeymoon is over so it seems.

The A.B.P.A was formed at a meeting in Tamworth in January 1994 and to date sixteen monthly news reports have been published and I have distributed over three thousand copies of the magazine to all corners of Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand, England and America.

We now boast 134 members and 23 Journalists and Clubs etc; who recieve our magazine. Out of all those who contribute to the Mag. there are only about three or four who have bothered to send in any newsworthy items for inclusion.

I receive many letters with such comments as, 'I always read my magazine before any other mail.' or 'What a great magazine,' and 'full of information that we like to hear,' as well as this latest from Brisbane, 'Congratulations on the latest (June 95) issue of the Bush Poets Magazine...variety....scandal.....intrigue.....humour.... It had everything except a wedding, and a suicide.....A great effort.'

However it appears that last months magazine was not well received as I had such comments as, 'A forum for the justification of events long past..'...A waste of wordage and paper that has become a hallmark for the A.B.P.A,' and 'last months' mag. was dissappointing because most of it was taken up with committee members airing dirty linen,' and worst of all — 'Why wasn't our event advertised in the magazine?'—'Why wasn't a report put in your magazine about our event?'

Well! Firstly I do not, and will not apologise for the contents of the June issue as I beleive every member has the right to send in comments on the events we attend and the running of those events, (good or bad,) and as for the comments pertaining to 'Joe Bloggs Adjudication Sheet,' due to the huge amount of bitching and backstabbing and general grumblings of some members at Winton, Carmel Randle thoughtthat clarification was necessary as to how the competition was judged and to give EVERYONE a look at the sheet and the manner in which they were judged.

The method of judging should be irrelevant which ever system is used, be it numbers or points or whatever, as long as all competitors were adjudged in the same manner. As a competitor at Winton, I only managed to recite four poems during the twelve days of the Festival and I am not complaining, (some members only had the chance to recite one or two poems.)

Competitons will always be dominated by the 'Top Runners' in any event, be it Poetry, Football, Car Racing or whatever. These people are the ones our audiences come to see and hear, but without the other competitors the event would be become a 'show' and cease to be a competition. The best person always wins.

Secondly. If your event was not advertised or reported in our news, then it is more than likely YOU didn't take the time to inform me about your event.

I prefer to get the magazine out by the twentieth of each month and would like news items and poems etc. to be in my hands by the fifteenth of each month to give me sufficient time to put it together.

So much for my airing of 'dirty linen,' and 'waste of wordage' for this month. Could we please have some nice letters in the future.

Tamworth. Fireside Festival. 2.3.4 June 1995.

Another great Fireside Festival was conducted at the Longyard Hotel in Tamworth to almost capacity crowds for all functions with the Saturday night being a complete sellout.

This year the Festival was brought forward a week from the usual long-weekend with seemingly no loss at all of patrons: more so the reverse in fact, with an increase in numbers attending. Unfortunately quite a few of our regular Poets were not able to attend, having functions elsewhere or insufficient time on their hands for the long journey necessary.

New visitors travelled from as far as Shepparton in Victoria, from far and wide in N.S.W. and Queensland.

Fireside Festival (cont'd)

The Poets in the Pub segment on the Friday night was well attended with the Poets Brawl conducted by the 'Angry Anderson' of Bush Poetry, John Philipson and Frank Daniel of Canowindra.

One minute Poems were still being written by the likes of Marion Fitzgerald, Bob Miller, Bob Magor, John Philipson and Carmel Randle right up and past the starting time. A very enjoyable time was had by all as a continual flow of ribbing one another and a certain amount of skiting by Mr. Miller about his somewhat unfortunate birth circumstances caused a minnie riot.

Murray Hartin and Gary Fogarty conducted a workshop for the children on the Saturday morning.

The young Poets were in their prime this year with some outstanding performances in the Junior competitions.

Paddy Ryan won the Senior section with his rendition of the great Mark Gliori Poem, 'Granny and the Snake.' An excellent performance.

Very very close on his heels was the runner up, Kendall Thompson, with a magnificient portrayal of Bruce Simpsons' "Brumby George in the City."

The Junior section was won by Jarrod Keach with a fluent, expressive poem entitled 'The Rough End of the Pineapple.'

Second place-getter was Heidi Davidson with a very lyrical poem done correctly for its' style, 'The Horses Are Coming.' All the junior performers were of a pleasing standard.

Midday Saturday saw the battle of the heavyweights as Queensland took on New South Wales in the Poets State of Origin.

The very impartial referee, Bob Magor, of Myponga in South Australia managed to keep things on an even keel during this great battle of the wits.

Queensland was captained by Bob Miller in the absence of their illustrious leader, Charlee Marshall. The Cane-toads went to war with the 'Mighty Maggot' trying every trick in the book to overcome the 'Mexicans' two nil lead in State of Origins, but with a defector from the south (Ray Essary) and a Pommie import (Shirley Friend) forming the front row with a new Hooker (Trish Anderson) he had no hope of curtailing the supremacy of the Cockroaches.

New South Wales was well ahead on points when their Captain was sinbinned for ten minutes for 'fighting' with the Mullumbimby Bloke; the resulatant penalties left them behind after a good run from the Winton Wonder (Gary Fogarty) and a free kick from Carmel Randle gave Queensland a further eight points.

A courageous effort from their Wyong Winger (Gary Lowe) and a hit below the belt from John Philipson coupled with a quick run up the sidelines by Marion Fitzgerald saw the trailing 'Blues' make a comeback in the final minute as a few minor adjustments were made to the Scoreboard.

Two very deserving and popular poets were elected to the wall of renown this year.

Bruce Simpson of Caboolture was honoured for his contributions to Bush Poetry with his works written over many years, revealing his true feelings and fervour for the real Outback and the bush, reflecting both on his own experiences and his great love for the country and country life gained first hand as one of our great old time drovers and camp bosses.

Bob Magor of Myponga was no surprise addition to the growing list of greats as his contribution to Bush Poetry is well represented in his fast selling books depicting the humorous side of country life and farming. Bob has also been performing for the past few years and is one of the great finds of the Longvard.

Congratulations to Bruce and Bob from all members of the Bush Poets Association.



Victoria and Tasmania. June 5 - 17.

Full credit must go to the four Bush Poets in their inaugural assault on Victroria and Tasmania this month. The main purpose of the trip being to bring to the people of the south an awareness of Bush Poetry and to give to them a sample of the sincerity and the humour in their four varying styles in their performances of both the classics and their original work.

The 1995 R.M.Williams Australian Whip Cracking Champion, Noel Cutler of Milawa, Victoria led the charge accompanied by Bob Magor of Myponga, South Australia, Geoffrey Graham, (the Man from Ironbark) of Bealiba Victoria, and Frank Daniel of Canowindra N.S.W.

Bob and Frank both attended the Fireside Festival (2-4 June) in Tamworth and had a fair touch of Poets-Lag by the next afternoon when they reached Bealiba, thirteen hundred kilometers away, for the first nights performance.

Performances were held nightly from then on in seven Victorian centres, with good attendances all round in towns such as Bealiba, Charlton, Bendigo, Echuca, Shepparton, Milawa and Albury.

Monday night was their night off, (?) as they travelled via T.T.Lines 'Princess of Tasmania' to Devenport in the Apple Isle for their first performance on the Tuesday at Burnie where they were welcomed with an interview on the ABC radio station. W.I.N. Television discovered them this day and and added to the fun by their inclusion in the nightly news programme.

Further engagements were, Hobart (Wednesday), which included another radio interview. Thursday, with a Workshop and performance in the Hobart Museum for the Arts Council of Tasmania to a group of one hundred and thirty children and parents.

This was followed by a rush trip to a further interview on FM 73 Radio, at Huonville followed by a concert at the wintery southern town of Cygnet.

Friday saw our Bards in the Tall Timber Forest at Maydeena for lunch where they were the guests of ANM and performed in a large marquee set up in the forest for the occasion which coincided with the concession of writer Mr. Peter McFie to produce a book on the history of forestry in this area over the past sixty years.

That night they appeared at the Royal Oak Tavern in Launceston to a capacity crowd. The overall response to the Tasmanian tour was very encouraging with new venues booked for a further trip and the usual big question, 'When are you coming back?'

The Battered Bugle Award for Bush Verse will be conducted again this year at Surat in Queensland on the banks of the Balonne River on 19th. and 20th. of August.

In 1994, the BATTERED BUGLE TROPHY was established. The competition for this was held in conjunction with a Cobb & Co. Festival in Surat on 12-14 August to celebrate the last run of Cobb & Co. in Australia, from Surat to Yeulba on 14th. August 1924.

It was customary for Coach drivers to sound a Bugle on their approach to the towns as a warning of their arrival.

Last year the Battered Bugle was presented for written verse on the subject of Cobb & co. and was won by Bob Magor of Myponga, S.A.

Each year the Battered Bugle will be competed for around the time of the 14th. August Anniversary. The criteria in future will be for the highest aggregate points gained from a Traditional Poem together with an Original Poem in an Oral Contest. Separate trophies will be awarded to the Best Traditional and Best Original. Trophies also will go to the best Locals in each section as well as the aggregate.

The Battered Bugle Trophie was made from local timber by Mr. Stephen Richardson. The Bugle on the trophy was donated by the Darlington Family and dates back to World War 1.

Other Trophies have been made from parts of the original corduroys from the historic Yueba to Surat Coach Route. They have been beautifully crafted by David Schwennesen and donated by the Schwennesen family.

On Saturday the festivities will kick off with Traditional Verse in the Vineyard in the relaxed gardens of the Villacoola Vineyard at 3. P.M. followed by Wine and Cheese and Afternoon Teas.

At 6.30 p.m. there will be a three course dinner at the Royal Hotel with entertainment from the Bush Poets and the Cobblegun Choir and the Surat Singers (Bush Songs). Tickets are \$15,00 each.

A delicious bush breakfast will be served at the Fishing Park overlooking the majestic Balonne River at 8.a.m. on the Sunday morning with more Bush Poetry and at 10.a.m. the Original Verse Section of the Competition will be conducted. At noon the Childrens verse will follow and then the presentation of Trophies.
