## Cowbell Classic — Allora Qld 22-23 October 1995

The tiny village of Allora on Dalrymple Creek in the southern region of the Darling Downs had two reasons to rejoice on the weekend of its Inaugural Cowbell Classic Poetry Festival. First of all was the influx of Bush Poets into this quiet dairying and grain district and secondly and most importantly was the very welcome RAIN.

Spirits were not dampened however and good crowds rolled up for the heats of the Junior, the Novice and the Open recital competitions.

Forty two Poets contested the Open Serious and Open Humerous sections of the 'Cowbell Classic'.

There were twelve Juniors and twenty Novice competitors, with plenty of new faces as well.

Allora Rotary Club president Jim Deacon was more than pleased with the resultant competitions and has no doubts about urging his fellow Rotarians to carry on with another show in the new year.

"It was our first effort, and we knew little about Bush Poetry competitions." Said Jim. "I cannot impress heavily enough the assistance rendered by Carmel Randle and members of the Australian Bush Poets Association."

Mark Gliori presented the

winners of the Novice with their certificates, with Noelle Wardle of Brisbane coming 1st. Hazel Whittle of the Gold Coast in second place followed by Olive Shooter of Allora, third.

Gary Fogarty compered the heats of the Poetry with guest perfromances by Mark Gliori, Frank Daniel and John Philipson.

The Smith family of fine poets took out the honours in the Junior Section with eleven year old Helen Smith being the overall winner with her own composition, 'Thoughts of Home'. Nine year old Kathleen Smith was second with a Bill Scott poem 'Possum'. Kathleen has also been heard on Macca on Sundays.

Six year old **Jeffery Smith** was placed third.

The Open Serious was really a battle for supremacy with a very deserved win going to Michael Darby of Cloncurry with his poem 'Shutdown'. He was followed closely by John Philipson of Tamworth with Henry Lawson's 'Sweeney' and Frank Daniel of Canowindra third with Henry Lawsons 'Jack Ellis'.

The Open Humerous saw a turn of events with another close contest when Frank Daniel hit a home run with 'God'll Get Ya!' while Glenny Palmer of Cedar Vale came second and John Philipson third.

The overall winner of the locally hand-crafted 'Cowbell Classic' Trophy, was won by Frank Daniel.

The **Poets Breakfast** was held indoors on the Sunday owing to the beautiful rain and a great roll up of local residents as well as visitors from Warwick and Toowoomba and places near and far were well and truly entertained by more than twenty poets.

## Poets at the Carnival — Towoomba 28-30th September

Another very successful Poets at the Carnival was organised and conducted by Carmel Randle in her usual manner leaving no stone unturned as she shuffled and shoved Poets, Comperes, Judges and Adjudicaters into and out of the very tight schedule which was without doubt the highlight of the Festival.

From the Registration of the Performers on the Wednesday night to the Grande Finale at the Bards of the Bush Concert in the City Hall on the Saturday night all went like clockwork thanks to her skilful deployment of labour and to the assistance rendered her by members of the ABPA.

A Performance Workshop was conducted by Mark Gliori of Warwick at the Southern Cross Sporting Club and was attended by more than twenty Bush Poets. A

rewarding couple of hours of entertaining hints on improving the delivery of verse and the handling of situations at various functions.

The first Poets Breakfast was held in Big Top at Queens Park and was compered by Mark Gliori.

Milton Taylor of Portland compered Heat 1 of the Hick-Cup which certainly drew some witty verse from the challengers. The Hick-Cup is a segment of one minute poems more commonly known as the Poets Brawl.

The Cobb and Co. Museum was the venue for two Presentations, one compered by Mark Gliori and one compered by John Philipson.

Heats of the Open Serious and Open Humerous Poetry were conducted in the Downs Room of the magnificient burkBurke and Wills Hotel. These heats were compered in stages by Marco, Bob Miller and Carmel Randle.

# Cedar Vale's lady poet still a 'bushy' at heart

B ORN in the country and brought up in the city, Australian Champion Lady Bush Poet, Glenny Palmer (pictured), of Cedar Vale, near Beaudesert, is a bushy at heart.

Winning the title of Australian Champion at the Australian Bush Poetry Championships in Winton during the Waltzing Matilda centenary celebrations earlier this year, Glenny was in Toowoomba last week for the annual Poets at the Carnival competition.

Glenny has had a successful year as a bush poet, also winning the original verse category in Surat's Battered Bugle competition in August, and taking out second place in The King of Verse original poetry section at the Gympie Country Music Muster a month ago.

She has had a fast rise to



bush poetry fame, only competing in bush poetry for the past 18 months.

"I went to a poetry evening in Beaudesert and my life as a bush poet began," Glenny

"I've always done a lot of writing and had stories and poems published. I suppose I have been writing poems all my life and thought I was the only one who did, until I was introduced to the Bush Poets Association."

Glenny has just written her first book of poetry, titled "Poems and Various Other Lies, By the Wandering Wordsmith".



With help such as this Murray thought anonymity would be the go, that he needed a character to hide behind, and entered under the name of Ned O'Dugan. He might as well have called himslef D'Arcy Kelly, as the organisers soon saw through his alias.

And so Murray Austin turned up at Toowoomba and took out first place in the Open Serious against some of the Countries most seasoned competitors.

Perhaps his heart wrenching preamble about redundancy twigged a tear in the eyes of the adjudicators.

Backstage before the finals in the City Hall, Murray commented that he used to play football years ago, but was never as nervous before a game as he was awaiting his turn on stage.

Welcome to the ranks of the Bush Bards, Murray.

Congratulations are in order for Ron Selby, our hard working Secretary Treasurer who celebrated his birthday on October 8th. Ron is now halfway and we wish him all the best from the ABPA

Now retired, Carmel divides her times between the Volunteers for Isolated Students Organisation (VISE) and writing and performing 9

Bush Poetry.

There are 'Many Faces' to Carmel Randle; the faces of Henrietta; the faces of Miss Ermytrude; the faces of Holly; the faces of Bush Poetry; the faces of experience; the faces of a boy; the faces of people she has known and the faces of Australia.

Why so many faces? Well you may ask, but when teaching in schools with ever nosy students and parents, anonymity is often the safest way to conceal ones identity in Literary circles to avoid Classroom 'distractions'!

Be it so, but Henrietta grew from a family challenge, 'I bet you can do better than that Mum!' after a particularly poor episode of 'Red Faces': Henrietta took up the bet. Carmel loves a challenge, and after a winning performance on the Telly one Saturday night, Henrietta was to become a star.

Another more recent publication from Carmel Randle is one designed to help budding authors and poets. Entitled 'Help', this book deals with the technicalities of writing and performing rhyming poetry.

It is a workshop type book suitable for authors aspiring to competition writing where technicalities may mean the difference between success and 'also-ran'.
