Presidents Letter.....Dear Members of the ABPA.

Judging by the number of letters, feedback and phone calls I am receiving nowadays, the 'Bush Poetry' ball is really rolling.

I received a welcome invitation to attend a Public Meeting in Perth WA. where Anne Farren, Community Arts Officer of the City of Melville had banded a group of enthusiasts together with intentions of forming the 'W.A. Bush Poets and Yarn Spinners Association'.

To create the right atmosphere and enthuse those attending, a concert was organised with performances by Kel Watkins (National Champion Yarn-spinner), Roger Montgomery (The People's Poet), Constance Herbert ('96 winner Wireless Hill Yarn Spinners Event) the inimitable Peter Capp, Melville's own Jeff Swain and Keith Lethbridge ('96 Winner Wireless Hill Poets Cup).

Being unable to attend, I passed on all relevant information regarding the ABPA, and have since received a reply from Rusty Christensen.

Rusty informs me that the timely arrival of my letter was encouraging and the accompanying information was well received and will be put to much use.

Thirty five enthusiasts turned up and were treated to some excellent demonstrations of Bush Poetry and Yarn Spinning. Most of them have indicated their keen-ness to form an association and a further meeting is scheduled for these foundation members who are all set to get the show on the road.

Exchange of newsletters between associations should see further development of the network of contacts between the States.

Let's hope this continues on to bigger things, we need it, and it is our only way of way of keeping in touch.

Continuing efforts from the Sydney area by Joye Dempsey and Rex Hockey are seeing newer developments in taking the Bush to the City. With the year 2000 approaching and the Olympic games, much is being done to corner some of the entertainment programme in the 'Big Smoke'. More news about this later.

Lovers of Australian Bush Poetry in Cunnamulla have united and established the Paroo Poets Society. The Paroo Poets are working with young people in local communities in outback Queensland to encourage and develop their writing skills and interest in bush poetry.

Another great development in Queensland has been the formation of the Charleville Bush Balladeers. Only six weeks old and already a written and a performance Competition scheduled for August 31st. during the local Festival Week.

Further news to hand has it that Neil Hulm, Bush Poet and Author, from

Lavington in Southern NSW has been appointed Secretary/Treasurer of the newly formed Snowy Mountains Bush Poets Association.

This is what I like to hear from people, and I ask that no matter how small or large your gathering is, there will always be someone who is interested to hear about it.

So! Put pen to paper and keep sending your news to us so that we may help you share it around. Tell us about your next function, and then when it is over, send us the results so that we may tell others.

Further to my letter of last month regarding media attention to Bush Poetry, Australian Lady Champion Glenny Palmer went to air on ABC Radio last month with Andrew Lofthouse and is scheduled to appear in the "Australian Story" which is seen on Wednesdays' around 8pm on ABC Television.

Keep an eye out in the next month or so for more coverage on the popular Television show, "Healthy Wealthy and Wise" where presenter Jim Brown reports on his visit to Canowindra NSW and the 'Marti's Hot Air Balloon Fiesta'. Jim was one of the Poets recorded on the first "Bush Voices" cassette at the National Outback Performing Arts Festival in Longreach.

New Bush Poetry Group — Charleville Qld.

The newly formed Bush Poetry Group, **Charleville Bush Balladeers**, have been very busy since their formation just six weeks ago.

During that time, they have planned and organised a written and performance competition to be held on August 31st. during the local festival week. They have also managed to raise a considerable amount of money from local businesses to help finance this venture.

A spokesman for the club said that the interest shown by people in the town has been very encouraging.

Club members cannot praise their very efficient, hard working secretary, Glenys Bently enough. Along with her husband Col (President), Terry Hanley (Treasurer) and Dale Leard (Publicity Officer), they have eaten, slept and dreamt Bush Poetry for the past few weeks.

This new member of the Bush Poetry family was the brain-child of Dale Leard, formerly of Longreach who was runner-up to Glennie Palmer at the Waltzing Matilda Bush Poets Championships at Winton this year.

Returning to Charleville after a twenty year absence, Dale began to push the Bush Poetry barrow with radio interviews, school visits and other voluntary performances for church and charity groups. A local man, Colin Bently, had nurtured a similar idea for several years and was then responsible for getting the club up and running.

John Major from Baralaba Q. will be the compere for the inaugural competition and several well known poets have agreed to attend as performers. Included among these are, Milton Taylor of Longreach Q. - Liz Ward of Mount Perry Q. - Michael Darby of Cloncurry Nth.Q. and Billy Hay who now resides in Brisbane.

Glenny Palmer has a new role in this competition as a judge. She says she is really looking forward to the challenge. The hard working ABPA Secretary/Treasurer/Editor, Ron Selby of Drayton Nth. Q. will also assist with the judging of some sections along with Tim Butler from the ABC in Longreach and Alan Palmer of Cedar Vale, Q.

The major trophy will be 'The Charleville Cup' for the most outstanding performer. Two local Silversmiths have created a miniature Mulga Tree from Silver which is mounted on a polished Mulga wood base. (The Charleville district is well know for the huge areas of Mulga forests that are used as a major source of fodder during times of drought).

The winner in each category will receive a cash prize and a medal, and placegetters will receive medals.

It is encouraging to see the Bush Poetry family tree spreading it's branches to different areas of Australia, and it is hoped that this competition will be the first of many in the South West Queensland area.

Queanbeyan (NSW) Bush Poets. Australia's oral history and traditions received a shot in the arm when the Queanbeyan Bush Poets held a 'Christmas in July' function at the Captains Flat Hotel on Saturday 27th.

Thirty three Bush Poets and guests took part in preserving traditions as old as the country itself. Now this isn't just scoffing down a luscious three course meal with all the trimmings and swilling back some wine and beer — Australians are well enough known for being good at that. And it wasn't the rustic atmosphere of the cosy pub dining room with its stout timber tables, real cutlery and two open fires casting a friendly, rosy glow over proceedings.

No! It was after all this that the poets set about preserving the heritage, suitably fortified. Picture a crowd of thirty three people retiring to a sitting room, with overstuffed chairs and another log fire, and sharing what Australians are really well know for - - Poems about the country and the bush, about people, places and long-ago faces. And spinning a few yarns as well.

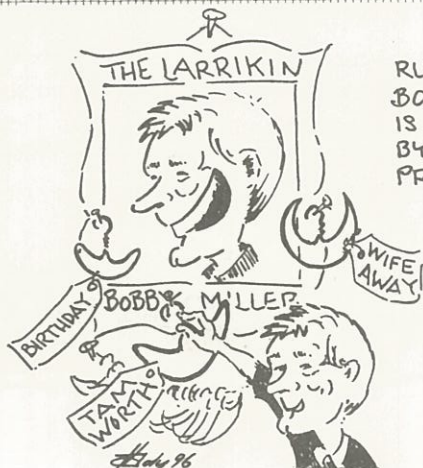
Australia may be known for its wool, but Australians are also known for the stories they tell. It's probably a "touch of the Blarney" inherited through many of our Irish settlers, though today it has an Aussie name — 'Bull'.

There was a lot of 'Bull' in some of the yarns told, but it preserves a heritage of tale-spinning and poetry that is woven into the fabric of the land, from Banjo Paterson and Henry Lawson to all the unsung poets of today.

Some original works were well received. Elaine Delaney provided backing sounds of the Currawong, the Bellbird and a Galah.

Music flowed late into the night with squeeze-boxes, harmonicas, a guitar and a bodhran, providing backing for some polkas.

During the recent performances at the QLD Art Gallery, a number of enquiries emerged about our Association. Andrew Lofthouse, (ABC Radio) interviewed me and gave out our Secretary's phone number, (you can thank me later, Ron.)

Channel 2 filmed me for " Australia Story" and channel 9 filmed me at Trish Anderson's new poetry venue, "Palma Rosa ", for their " Brisbane Extra " show. Hopefully, all of this will generate more membership for our Association.

May I encourage members to push for media coverage of any of their achievements, however large or small, they may perceive them to be. It all adds up to a wider appreciation of our craft, and a wider support. (Some writer's magazines have a " credits" section where members successes are recorded..... perhaps such a column in our magazine would be encouraging.)

May I also thank the folks who have sent their good wishes and congratulations on my win at Winton.... in particular, Valerie Lopez, for her kind and generous gesture, and Ellis Campbell, whose letters (July issue) show an obvious intricate understanding of some of the difficulties that accompany the perceived " Prestige " of winning a competition that was promoted as a major event.

The prize I have so far been promised, consists of one return flight to Los Angeles. BUSH POETS OLYMPIC VERSE GAINS WIDE ACCLAIM

Earlier this year Robert Raftery had a chance encounter with Laurie Lawrence, the official motivator for the Australian Olympic Team, Laurie was so impressed with Roberts writing he asked him to write a sport specific poem for use at the games in Atlanta. The poem entitled "We're goin' for Gold" was so well recieved that Laurie contacted Robert and requested more.

During the course of the games robert wrote and forwarded a further nine poems. The International media have focused their attention on these sport specific poems and Australian audiences will have an opportunity to hear some when channel 7 screens it's post Olympic specials.

Robert recently broke new ground for the Bush Poets when he wrote the Mission Statement for BHP's Norwich Park Mine in central Queensland.

Robert was "on tour" with John & Joy Major and after they had performed at the Dysart Bowls Club, Mr Clem Suttle, the chief Surveyor for the mines, asked Robert to write their Mission Statement in rhyme and metre. The poem includes information about BHP's involement in the Central Queensland venture. The Norwich Park Mine management are delighted with the poem.

Robert has been writing poetry for many years but has only recently joined the ranks of the performance poets. However he is held in such high regard as a writer that many performance poets choose to present his work.

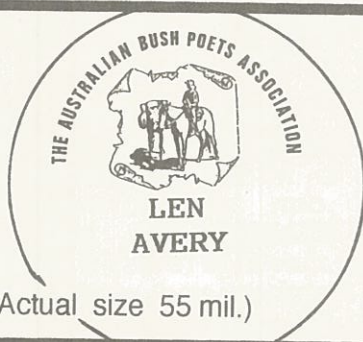
