

It was then on to Longreach for a few days to meet Trisha Anderson and Alan and Glenny Palmer, then out to Bill's relatives' property at Elabe Station about halfway between Muttaburra and Hughenden. I was doing the driving along this bumpy dusty road with Bill and Trish up front and Alan and Glenny in the back of the camper with about two tons of dust, to the chorus of "Get rid of that bloody rally driver"! I don't know why they wouldn't let me drive back! However, we spent two glorious days on Elabe and put on another show for the country folk. You would be very hard pushed indeed to meet nicer people anywhere. Then it was on to Winton where we stayed at the Tattersals Hotel and the very generous hospitality of Paul and Sonya Neilson.

The Winton Competition and all the festivities were ably handled by Carmel Randle and Bert Swindell of the Winton Tourist Association and though there may have been a few hiccups, I didn't hear too many complaints, other than a fine from "the boys in blue" for a seat belt infringement!

The Matilda Centre is a credit to Winton and all the bodies associated with it's design and construction - they are to be congratulated. The Winton people seem to be bending over backwards for the poets and the running of this annual event.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I belong to three other writing organisations beside ABPA. They all regularly warn members to be wary of overseas competitions, particularly American ones. some of these do apparently have Australian addresses for entries, but are still American controlled. There are hundreds of thousands would-be poets around the world, all desperate for some form of recognition or publication of their work.

These organisations advertise a poetry competition with attractive prizes. They rarely advertise in writers' magazines, but more likely in some womens' magazine, etc: where there is more chance of trapping the unwary.

EVERYONE who enters received a letter saying they have written a beautiful, sensitive poem, comparable to Homer, Wordsworth or some other great poet of the past. Their poem is to be included in an anthology, on sale at prices usually ranging from \$90 - \$110. I have been told these anthologies are poorly produced, with a real value of somewhere between \$20 and \$30.

Of course the desperate author is so thrilled by this sudden "discovery" of their hidden talent that they are gullible enough to buy the anthology. After the cloud nine adventure wears off the poor people realise that they are not only still nobody in the literary world, are mortified by their gullibility, and \$100 or so poorer.

Some good poets have deliberately written awful verse and sent it to these competitions. Sure enough back came the soppy letter telling them they have written a

beautiful, sensitive poem etc; The affairs of these people are constantly under investigation, but as yet it has not been proved that what they are doing is illegal. No self respecting poet that I know of will have any part of these competitions.

I am not sure if anyone actually gets prize money out of these competitions. Perhaps they do choose a winner and pay him/her, and make their packet out of the rest of the less fortunate. Poets who have never won any kind of writing award in their lives have been crowned "world champion poet" by some of these organisations. Surely a little hard to believe. Isn't it a bit like taking your old cart horse to Melbourne and winning the Cup?

To the many writers desperately seeking recognition I say: there are many very good competitions in Australia, such as The Bronze Swagman, The Diamond Shears, Eaglehawk, Maryborough, The Grampians, The Bush Lantern, Mt. Isa, Camooweal, Hastings FAW, Gulgong Henry Lawson, Bowraville, Bribie Island, Ballarat, Sunshine Coast, Macarthur, Central coast, Warwick, Tenterfield, Denis Butler - the list is endless. These competitions are run by fair dinkum committees, judged anonymously and awards made on merit.

I urge would-be poets to enter some of these and forget the overseas ones. Of course, they won't write and say you have written a great poem when in fact it is quite awful, but you will learn something from the better writers and when you do get a prize you can cherish it with real pride. It is not easy winning prizes in these Australian competitions, but when you do, it is very satisfying - rather than being conned by some slick operator from overseas.



COMMENTS on DRAFT "CODE OF ETHICS from Marco Gliori

A PERSONAL EXPERIENCE

A friend of a friend recently told me they were relaxing at a popular Queensland tourist venue when they heard two of my poems being recited by the resident entertainer. After much laughter and applause (yet no acknowledgment of authorship) this friend approached the person and confronted him with the knowledge that they knew the author of those poems. The reaction I'm told was quite sheepish and conversation quickly moved on to other things.

When all of those tourists leave a situation like that and return to their respective parts of Australia they take with them an 'assumption' that they heard a Poet reciting his or her original work. Fair enough that they be recognised a wonderful performer, but surely the work put into 'writing' a piece that inspires or entertains can be duly recognised by the performer as a sign of appreciation to the writer. That is my opinion. What's yours ????

YOUR OPINION

Whilst recently comparing at the "Oracles of the Bush" an alert member of the audience (a poet groupie) approached me after hearing a poet perform someone else's work and politely suggested I ask all poets to acknowledge authorship at some stage during the performance.

I went a step further in what was a friendly and intimate setting and explained our present debate about the "Code of Ethics". I then asked the 80 strong audience (very few of whom were poets) for a show of hands if they thought every performer should feel obliged to do this. I would say almost without exception that each person immediately (and I might add in some cases .. vehemently) raised their hands.

MY MISTAKE

I first heard Claude Morris's "A Grave Situation" from a mate who told me 'who' the author was and wrote out a copy for me ... minus a few verses. It worked well and that was how I learnt it. Quite innocently I had altered the way the author originally intended the poem to be. I no longer recite the poem, but having met Claude Morris just prior to his death, I got the feeling that he wouldn't have minded some discreet changes to the dialogue so as to suit the 'individual performer'.

I myself have indicated that I have no problem with 'discreet' changes being made to my own poems for the purpose of an individual's own style of presentation. Perhaps it comes back to Keith McKenry's suggestion in his draft code of ethics 'with their approval'.

What do YOU think. Let us know of your own personal experiences.


LUIGI (C) Neil Hulm, Lavington VIC (from Neil's Book "Aussie Bush Comedy")

"VISION WINTION'S' BUSH POETRY SUCCESS STORY

All facets of Bush Poetry were on display in Winton at the "Easter in the Outback Celebrations" which incorporated the opening of the new Waltzing Matilda Centre.

Winton is well on the way to establishing itself as the Bush Poetry Capital of Australia, where organisers paid out in the region of \$25,000 to poets this year.

Thanks must go to Carmel Randle for her organisational skills in both competitive and non competitive components, the ABPA

for allowing our committee to hold the Australian Bush Poetry Championships in conjunction with the Qantas Waltzing Matilda Bush Poetry Awards, the poets who assisted Carmel with the running of the Junior Bush Poetry Festival - the largest of it's kind in Australia and probably the world, the staff at the schools who attended and, of course our sponsors, who assist us in our endeavors

The Bronze Swagman Award for original written bush verse, attracted 593 entries from all over Australia, USA and the UK, the standard of which was extremely high. Conducted by Winton Vision Inc. since 1972, this award is seen by the majority of Bush Poets as the most prestigious of it kind.

The Little Swaggies Award for written verse for primary and secondary schools attracted some 387 entries from across Australia, increasing by 67 on last year.

Entries in the Junior Performed Poetry individual performances doubled, totaling 225 and participating schools in the Performed section increased from 7 to 15.

During the Senior Performed Festival, which included non-competitive events and Poet's Commonwealth games, around 76 poets performed, again almost double that of last year.

Some humorous highlights of the celebrations were seen in the Poet's Commonwealth Games where teams from all areas competed with comical verse. A

roving reporter was present when ABPA President Ron Selby competed as a member of "The Gulf Prawns" and he is reported to have been dressed in red tights holding some springs of a coolabah tree above his head and pirouetting on stage with a milk crate beside him, a sign on which said "Billy's Bong". All this was done while other members of the team sang "Once a jolly Gulf Prawn camped (?) by a 'billy bong' under the shade of a coolabah tree". The legs weren't bad either.

Mark Tempany's sudden exit off the back of the stage during the last performance of "Laughs, Lies and Larrikins" made the audience draw breath for what seemed a terribly long time until a single strum of his guitar was heard. At least the instrument was OK!!!

STOP PRESS - RULES CHANGES FOR 1999

At the traditional Poet's Picnic out in the bush after the competition was over, the question of deciding how the winners in the open and novice sections should be decided was the subject of great and spirited debate.

The current conditions state that points scored in the first two rounds will be added together to determine who will go into the finals of each section. These points are then discarded and the winner is determined by the number of points scored in the final.

The Organising Committee of Vision Winton has listened to the arguments put forward by a large majority of the poets who attended the picnic, and from 1999 onwards, the winner will be determined by aggregating the points scored in all three rounds. This should give a winner who is an all round consistent performer. The total of the first two rounds will still determine who goes into the finals.

It is the belief of our committee, that this years competition has again found two worthy Ambassadors to go to Elko, Nevada USA.
