THE LAST OF THE SWAGGIES

I met him many years ago at a Folkie's Festival,

- One chance in a thousand maybe - if we were to meet at all.

'Twas at a poet's breakfast where we'd gathered for a treat
Of rhyming verse and laughter, while we had a bite to eat.
They filled my glass with champers and we laughed till we could cry
As each poet's new rendition sent our spirits souring high,
And I scarcely could fathom all the comic yarns I heard ...
But poets never lie, they say, so I didn't doubt their word.

Yet what I didn't realise, my turn would come around, Though shaking fierce from head to toe, I tried to stand my ground And recite a little poem about the creatures of this land And the need for conservation, for us all to understand. As this was a first for me, was I glad when it was done, But what I didn't know back then, the fun had just begun, For someone spoke the words I'm not likely to forget ... And boosted hopes - in days to come - I'd make a poet yet.

For at the end of the proceedings, when I left to find my way To yet another venue on this poets' holiday,
He suddenly stood before me - one of whom you only read - In books of Lawson and the Banjo, as they are a dying breed. Raven hair hung to his shoulders in a thick unruly mass, His skin as dark as weathered wood, a native man, I guess, Akubra hat a mangled bit of felt through constant wear Sat on his head, and sheer determination kept it there.

He carried his possessions in a swag upon his back
And his boots were telling stories of his life upon the track,
But his smile was genuine, as he made himself known
And said "My name is Campbell," in a quiet undertone.
"It's nice to meet you here at last, for I love the verse you read,
I've long memorised it's lines for the message that it spread,
For I recite your poem in the camps way in the scrub,
Or when I'm busking on the mall, in a park or roadside pub."

I've met him many times since then, reciting in the street
Of yet another out-back town where poets tend to meet,
To relive the old tradition of performing verse in rhyme
And build the book-learned bridges which will span the space of time;
But comes the morning after, you will find him thumb a ride
On a truck or cattle-train ... just drifting on the tide
His swag beside him on the ground, for he is travelling light,
A vision from another age, a long-forgotten sight.

I don't know where he stems from, or whether he's True Blue Or if he drifted to these shores as some are wont to do, But one thing is for certain, in his simple swaggie's way He keeps alive the legends of the bards of yesterday; And when night-time closes in on a distant Western town He finds himself a place to sleep and often settles down Somewhere underneath a bridge, for he is living pretty rough ... Like true swaggie's did before him, and to me he's true enough.

MAPLETON YARN FESTIVAL .. the eighth annual ..

Come September 26th and 27th and the verdant hills of Mapleton in Queensland's Sunshine Coast hinterland will ring with mingled sound of poets, comedians, storytellers, laughter and applause.

Astute followers of the Mapleton Yarn Festival will be quick to note that this year's event has been brought forward by a few weeks in the hope of better weather than that of the past few festivals. In any weather, though, the Yarn Festival has developed over the years as a friendly and supportive venue with some wonderful entertainers on tap. This year will be no exception.

Organiser Jacqueline Bridle (who also co-ordinates the spoken word at the Woodford Folk Festival) says the list of performers is a long one and includes favourites like Bobby Miller, Shirley Friend and the welcome return of Mark Gliori.

Special guest this year is S. Sorrenson from Northern NSW who is one of the most laid back comics you'll find anywhere and not to be missed. He will also present an inspiring workshop with a few tips for novice poets and those suffering from stage fright.

We also take great pride in introducing Mark Feldman. After emerging at this year's Woodford festival, Mark headed southward for the National Folk Festival in Canberra at Easter and returned home with the title of Australian Champion Reciter.

The Ernie Setterfield Club Challenge is on again but note that this year the heats are on the Saturday afternoon to fit everything in. Two entries from each club or group, one serious, one humorous .. may be performed with either different people or the one person doing both. This event will be hosted by last year's winner Phil Morrison of Gympie.

"Charlee's Angels Poetry Awards" will be held on Saturday 26th, 1-3pm, to encourage the children under 13 years to recite. There will be two sections, "Original" and "Borrowed", and two age groups.

The "Can't Bowl for Laughing" show at the Bowl's club at 7pm on Saturday night will definitely be a highlight. In memory of the late Charlee Marshall, a long time festival friend, this show packs together a lot of performers and a few surprises.

program Sunday's includes a Poet's Breakfast, Yarnspinning, The Great Australian Whine, Finals of Charlee's Angels Competition and the Ernie Setterfield Contest.

There is no need to pre-register for any of the competitions, nor does it cost to enter them. Festival entry is \$3.00 for the Saturday night show, Sunday entry is \$7.00 adults and \$2.00 for kids for the whole day.

Although there is no accommodation at the festival itself, the Lilyponds Caravan Park is very close (cabins and camping ... ph 07 5445 7238) and a number of motels and guest houses operate along the range. POET PROFILE - NOEL STALLARD

Gympie born Noel has taught in Primary and Secondary schools for the past 34 years. In that time he has taught Drama to senior students for ten years, produced seven musicals including; "Annie Get your Gun", "The Boyfriend", "West Side Story", "The King and I", "The Misadventures of Snow White", "Oliver" and "Son of the Phantom".

He has a passion for performing the poems of John O'Brien and has been doing this for schools, Senior Citizen Groups, Service Clubs, Folk and Bush Poetry Festivals over the past fifteen years.

Noel's first contact with the O'Brien poetry was at Teachers College and his first teaching assignment was at Albury where Monsignor Hartigan, the author of the poems was a household name. Fascination with the poems grew because of the genuine humour, the pioneering characters and the turn-of-the-century culture they portrayed.

One of Noel's life long ambitions is to have the poems of "Around the Boree Log" and "The Parish of St Mel's" as popular with the Australian people as the poems of "Banjo" Paterson and Henry Lawson.

Noel takes a character Fr. O'Brien dressed in biretta, cassock, roman collar and speaking with an Irish accent. Noel's grandmother was Irish so the accent is not all that difficult. At times this character changes depending on the persons being presented in the poems.

Recently at a Bush Poet's Festival, Noel won three major awards - Open Male Humorous, Open Male Serious and Novice.

With Monsignor Hartigan's gift of writing poetry and Noel's dramatic talent of presenting the poems, he hopes that Australians of all ages will know better not only who they are and where they are going but who they were and where they came from.

MONSIGNOR PATRICK HARTIGAN - (John O'Brien)

He was born at Yass in southern New South Wales in 1878. Both parents came from County Clare, Ireland. He spent most of his life as a parish priest in such towns as Albury and Berrigan and for 27 years in Narrandera. There was a milkman in Narrandera named O'Brien and rumour had it that he used to water down the milk. Fr Hartigan jokingly referred to his poetry as watered-down poetry and when he first published his poems under the title of 'Around the Boree Log' he used the pen name of John O'Brien. Fr. Hartigan once said, "We must recognise our literature in order that we recognise our own land. He died of cancer in Sydney in 1952.

POET PROFILE - BRIAN BELL and BOOK REVIEW

After publishing eight statistical books about Top 40 music, Brian Bell started writing poetry in 1992 and subsequently won the Henry Lawson award at Gulgong in 1996 with a poem about the environment called 'Expedience (or YOU think I'm a cynic?)'

He is an extremely prolific writer, self-publishing seven books since then. He writes about seventy percent in rhyme and the rest in free verse. His work often reveals unexpected twists, and many poems have a depth of feeling that is not often seen in poetry with meaning.

Brian also convenes 'Writers on the River' which meets at Caddies Coffee Shop, 2-3 Castlereagh St., Penrith on the last Thursday of each month.

Brian's publications are:

'My First Book of Poems' is a collection of various works 1993 - 1996 including "Blue Mountains 1994" and "Australia's Unknown Soldier", both of which were Highly Commended in the 1994 Henry Lawson awards, and "Restoration", a light hearted look at the vintage car movement.

'Living With Alcohol' is poetry on alcoholic relationships. Brian, never a drinker, says he is amazed at the number of people who read the book and later ask how long he has been sober. "Don't worry Mum" is one of the many poems likely to have you running for the tissues.

'Small Matters' - is poetry about children people have lost, written from stories heard from people Brian has met, from miscarriage to late teenage and even adult children who have died. Hope shines through the book's validation of pain and it is likely to restore energy to anyone grieving such a loss. "Tuesday Night Quilters" is a fine example of the feeling throughout the book.

collection of bush verse, including the title poem, highly commended in the 1997 Bronze Swagman Competition and the 1996 Gulgong Henry Lawson winner 'Expedience'. It contains some powerful recollections of Vietnam and some humorous ones as well.

'Men Have Feelings II' mixes poetry about childhood humiliation with deep conceptual verses on relationships with women and children. The haunting 'Claire', 'Father Please' and 'The Song at the End' (a splendid and moving eulogy) are all well worth reading.

'The Little Red Recovery Book' consists of very deep and meaningful poems, and it's purpose is to allow people who have difficulty coping with life to see that they are not alone. 'Honeycomb Dreams' is an excellent poetry/monologue on childhood, and 'Ten Minutes Every Thursday' relates how a man feels when his marriage falls apart.

MEMBER'S COMMENT on 'WHO JUDGES THE JUDGES?'



Dear Editor.

Time has certainly come for such comment, thank you Bobby Miller. Not that it hasn't been said before, but it is now more apparent than ever that qualified, knowledgeable and experienced judges should be incorporated into a panel from which they can be drawn by organisers, ensuring success and satisfaction in their competitions.

It is well past the time when just any person can sit on a panel of judges and decide through some means of his own, the best and fairest on the day. The quality of Performance Bush Poetry today is very much higher than it was just three, four and five years ago. The standard is far greater and the new poets continually appearing are a credit to the association and themselves. These competitors need in the same vein, competitive, enthusiastic, qualified judges.

Notably the ABPA has a tendency to forget what it has done in the past. There is rarely any strong follow up to accepted rules or motions, much of which just fall by the way. Not enough people want to get involved, very few have the time.

At the 1996 AGM in Tamworth, I believe we adopted a set of rules drawn up by Carmel Randle. The same ideas, or variations there-of, have been used as the judging criteria ever since by so many festivals whether they adopted 'Carmel's Rules" or not. After all, they make the most sense. This accepted criteria is available from the ABPA on what is called an "ASSESSMENT SHEET" to which is attached "a brief explanation of the ASSESSMENT SHEETS for the information of adjudicators."

The set criteria is simple and basic, easy to follow, but the method of assessment was not accepted by some judges as a correct form of adjudicating.

This I found hard to believe, as the results of their findings could have been recorded on these sheets and then made available to scrutineers, competitors and concerned persons in an orderly and understandable manner.

This criteria, as far as I am concerned needs very little alteration (if any) and should be accepted nationally by competition organisers which would avoid confusion. This form of assessment is still in my opinion the best and fairest method, providing the adjudicators understand the ruling.

The Judging criteria as set down is as follows; "Preamble, Start of Poem, Body of Poem, Conclusion, Audibility, Audience Rapport and Personal Assessment (of the Judge)." To this I add that a personal assessment should consider Appearance and Performance Skills.

This 'rule of thumb' could be adopted (again), need not be too greatly varied (if at all), and should be accepted nationally. During my term as President of the ABPA Inc., I distributed copies of same, plus "Hints for Groups and Organisations" on running poetry competitions and festivals etc. to a number of new organisations and interested persons. I never once received a complaint or a comment, so can only assume that the information was acceptable.

How does a judge see this? In many different ways no doubt. Do some of them see it at all? Ask yourself.

Consider, at a recent competition in Queensland where it was reported that a highly respected media personality of supposedly satisfactory qualifications to judge performance poets missed some of the "action" whilst attending to at least two mobile phone calls midperformances. Not what I would call a fair crack of the whip for the poor competitors; it must have been very offputting for the poets concerned.

Judging workshops are possibly the answer, as Mr. Miller suggests, but who will judge the judges I ask again. How many want to be told? Will they want to listen? It will not be an easy item to set up and bring into practice. Still the subject needs broaching within the association.

Regarding the *Code of Ethics*, I have seen a number of letters on the subject which was originally brought up some years ago by Marco Gliori and followed later by Keith McKenry, but again, all the letters are saying the same thing. "We should have a Code of Ethics." So what? Who wants it? Has anybody made a move as yet to set one up? It appears not. At the AGM in January this year, moves were made in this direction, but I'm not aware of any follow-up. It will take a lot of time and effort, will be of no avail unless it can be policed. Who wants to police such a matter?

If a Code of Ethics was established, would it make any difference. The Ten Commandments have been around for years and get broken every day. We are in a position now where, if we can't trust ourselves, who can we trust? The Code of Ethics basically comes back to doing the right thing, by yourself and your peers. (Read Rhubarb's Poem, page 18 August). That makes enough sense to me. I have just retired from a business where red tape and hooey ruled the roost. It made an enjoyable job a fair mongrel, believe me and I know I won't miss it. Let's just keep having fun and enjoy each others company and poetry by sharing and respecting.

Finally another continually arising subject is the terminology "Bush Poetry". During my term as President I had numerous letters on the subject. The most common complaint, if I may call it such, was that most of the scribes insisted that it was not bush poetry if it was not about hobble chains and camp-wear.

Bush Poetry was first termed in the 1880's, before any publication of "The Banjo" appeared in the Bulletin. Bush writing and verse came into being as Australian writers began to look at Australia, not through English eyes, but through Australian eyes, accounting themselves thus far to an account of the way of life of the Bush people. On the first of March 1881, what is often taken as the first bush ballad, 'Sam Hold' by Ironbark, appeared in the 'bushman's bible', the Bulletin.

Later that decade it was the likes of 'Banjo' and Lawson who set the ball rolling, but if you are an avid fan of Paterson or Lawson you will find that they had a lot more to write about than general bush life. Both wrote a great deal of topical and political poetry, poetry on love, war, republicanism, social comment and poetry of the day.

Had there been 'Bikies' and Harley Davidsons in Banjo's time I am sure he would have written about 'Hogs' and 'Fatboys' as well.

whether urban oriented or rural, are doing exactly what the great masters did, writing about the things they see around them.

One other concern was the fact that some of my writers insisted that only an experienced person can write 'bush'. I don't believe this. Any skilled writer given the facts, followed up with suitable research can write on any subject he or she chooses, with varying results. Take for instance the Centenary Year of Waltzing Matilda (1995),

when in Winton Q., a written competition was held for rhyming bush verse on the subject of Waltzing Matilda. Some 2,600 entries were received on this one subject. Were they all written by experienced bushmen, drovers, ringers,

swaggies, shearers, sheep stealers or what? Not at all. The winning author was a former Queensland Detective of Italian-Australian heritage. Thank you

from Neil McArthur, Ballarat, Vic. Dear Fellow Bards.



I have keenly following the discussion on the proposed Code of Ethics and feel it is too soft and would like to offer an alternative 10 point plan. I would welcome any debate on my proposal.

- Any poet who fails to give due credit to the author of the poem they have recited shall have the aforementioned author's name branded on their forehead with a hot poker.
- Any poet who changes the words of another author's work shall have their tongue amputated and be banned from performing until they offer a formal "spoken"
- 3. If a poet's work shows any resemblance to that of another poet, then the copyright shall be sold to the highest bidder with all funds raised going to a reputable charity (e.g. "Help Neil McArthur Pay Next Month's Rent Fund").

- Plagiarism will not be tolerated at any cost (less 4. than \$100 per judge).
- No poet will be allowed to write on a subject previously used by another author (e.g. The Bush, Horses, Australia etc.).
- Swear words will not be tolerated during a performance unless they are short and of no more than four letters.
- Any poet found guilty of failing to rhyme their poetry will be excommunicated to Nimbin.
- No poet may appear on stage naked before 8 pm unless drunk.
- Bobby Miller, Ray Essery and Marco Gliori shall be horsewhipped on a monthly basis (this has nothing to do with ethics but would be loads of fun!!).
- As formulator of this Code of Ethics Neil McArthur shall remain as the only poet exempted from the above rules.



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
