



Betty Olle was born in Emerald, Central Queensland, but was forced to leave all that behind to enter the competition called 'living'. She trained as a general nurse in Bundaberg and as a midwife in lovely Hobart. She loved being a midwife, and remained a practising



one (except for some time off to become the mother of three boys and two girls) until age and arthritic knees forced her to retire.

Betty has always loved words and the English language and has written poetry from her teenage years. During her nursing years she wrote skits and ditties for 'inhouse' magazines, Christmas skits, etc. Because of these activities and her husband's friendship (and therefore hers also) with Skew Wiff Watt, she was encouraged to enter Winton's Bronze Swagman Competition in 1987 and had her poem published. She was runner-up in this competition in 1988 and won the little bronze man himself in 1992.

She has won places in other competitions as well, and has had other poems in succeeding Bronze Swagman Books. Although Betty has never published her own book of poetry, she has been involved in three books of Children's Poetry, edited by Carmel Randle, and reviewed recently in the ABPA Newsletter. She says, "perhaps she writes children's poetry because "I Dips My Lid" (published on this page) has the distinction of having been written and recited 56 years ago. She wrote it when she was a very patriotic teenager, for a concert to raise funds to buy 'War Bonds' during the war in 1944.

# Writers and websites: where are you sending your money?

Arts Law has recently come across some Internet deals requiring caution. The first involved a poetry competition where the authors were subsequently asked to buy a book with their poems in it and found their poems reproduced on a website. The second involved an offer to "publish" which wasn't. In both cases, the common factor was the request to send money. Unless you are completely sure that the business behind the site is reputable, beware.

Situation 1: Entering poetry competitions

Arts Law has received a number of calls from concerned poets who have found their poems published on a website. The callers had one thing in common - some time ago they had all originally submitted their poems in response to newspaper advertisements offering the chance to win a competition prize consisting of money and publication in a poetry anthology. Months later, they all received a letter reprinting their poem and asking for permission to publish it in the anthology - provided they ordered an expensive copy of the proposed anthology. This condition had not been mentioned in the original competition entry form. The letter also asked for permission to publish the poem on the company's website.

Upon inspecting the website, our callers found that their poems were already published there. The callers all wished to have their poems removed from the website and to prevent any further publication by this company. They wanted to know how to respond to the letter they had received from the company, and whether they had to buy a copy of the book.

Did submitting the poem to the competition give permission to publish?

Some of the callers thought that, perhaps by entering the competition, they had somehow given permission for the company to publish their works on the website, or even in the anthology. Arts Law explained that this was not likely to be the case. There was nothing in the original advertisement to suggest that permission was being requested to publish the poem on the website. Nor was it likely that permission to publish in the anthology itself could be implied in these circumstances, particularly as none of the callers appeared to have won. In addition, by sending the callers a release form, the company had admitted that permission was required.

Arts Law advised the callers to write to the competition organisers stating that they did not have permission to

reproduce the poems in any way, including on the Internet, and demanding that the poems be removed from the website immediately. We advised that they had no obligation to buy the book.

What should you do when submitting work to a competition? Always read the terms of any competition very carefully before you enter. In some cases, you may find that you have assigned copyright in your poem, or granted extensive publication rights, just by signing the entry form.

In general, you should:

- \* read the fine print of any competition forms or other invitations to submit work; and
- \* seek advice if you are not sure what any terms mean; and
- \* if you believe someone has published your work without permission, seek advice on a letter of demand as soon as possible. You may be entitled to damages or other remedies for copyright infringement.

Situation 2: "Internet publishers" - what are they really offering?

A caller sought advice on a letter from an United States Internet company offering to "publish" his work. On examination, the offer did not contain any of the usual provisions to be expected in a publishing agreement. First, the author was required to send payment for the print run up front, rather than receiving the usual advance from the publisher and royalties on sales. Second, the company was not offering to do any marketing or distribution as would normally be expected from a publisher. Rather, the company simply offered a "free listing" on the website and free warehousing for a year, and indicated that if the author wanted any copies of the book sent to Australia, he would have to pay for shipping fees as well. The letter offered to send the author a more detailed "publishing agreement" for signature provided he committed to a print run.

Arts Law advised that, on its face, the letter was not an offer to= publish within the industry meaning, as the most crucial element of= publishing was missing: the publisher's up-front capital investment= giving it an incentive to promote the book. In this deal, the Internet= company would make its money as soon as the author paid for the print run. It would therefore have no incentive for sales. It might even be difficult for the author to know if the entire print run hadbeen produced to order as the company was overseas.

Arts Law advised that the offer was effectively equivalent to self-publishing through a local printer, although with less control given to the author as the books would be located overseas. Arts Law therefore advised the caller to be cautious and to investigate the track record of the company as well as other means of publishing before committing.

### Potted Personalities with Marilyn Roberts

Loves Labours Lost an apt description of the life of Henry Lawson.

Lawson was born on 17th June 1867 at Grenfell to Niels (Peter) Larsen and Louisa (nee Albury). He grew up on a poor selection at Eurunderee with a domineering mother and a father often away. At nine he developed an ear infection that was to worsen and eventually leave him profoundly deaf.

Lawson's mother was to be one of the most elusive women in his life, not believing in displays of emotion and driven to prove herself in artistic and women's suffrage spheres she was often not emotionally or physically available to her children. She was difficult to live with because of her own artistic temperament and unresolved grief at the loss of one of her twin daughters but she did lay the foundation of his early literary experiences, introducing her family to her favourite authors and poets. Early in his life Lawson strove for her attention, at 17 he moved to Sydney to join her in her ventures. It was through his mother's interests that Lawson was to meet the next significant woman of his life, Mary Cameron (later to become Dame Mary Gilmore) then a young schoolteacher. They became close friends until his mother sabotaged that friendship. In 1891 Louisa became concerned with the relationship forming between the two and reacted by sending Henry and his brother Peter to Western Australia. Mary Gilmour claimed that Henry had proposed to her, even asking her on the night before his departure to go to the registry office with him. She remained a friend through many ups and downs, and he sought her both after his foray to Brisbane to work for the Boomerang, and after his trip to Bourke. But in all this time he alternated visits with her to visits to the more seedy side of life. (In fact it was because of his behaviour that his friends arranged for The Bulletin to send him off to Bourke to get him away from the drink.) the drink.) By this time Lawson had become quite a heavy drinker and perhaps this including her strong desire to help found the "New Australia Colony" in Paraguay influenced her decision to reject him again in 1893. Even so when in 1895 Mary Cameron was packed to leave for the new colony she declares he again came and begged not to go.

It was Bertha Bredt Lawson finally married on 15 April 1896. By now having finally gained some recognition he often went on colourful rounds of escapades in which large amounts of alcohol were consumed in the company of his "Dawn to Dusk Club" friends. Life with a temperamental, alcoholic and often broke genius was difficult. The Lawsons tried their luck in Western Australia then in New Zealand, where Henry taught for several years until Bertha's advancing pregnancy and loneliness necessitated a return to Sydney, and his old friends. (Mary not having heard of his marriage wrote to him in this time asking him to join her in Paraguay and hinting at marriage.) Upon his return though he was frustrated at lack of recognition and, drinking heavily, he was soon put in a home for inebriates. By now the marriage needed more help, not only was drinking a problem but so was Henry's liason with 29 year old Hannah Thorburn. Funded by George Robertson (of Angus and Robertson), and other friends, the Lawsons' departed for London. For the first time life looked assured but London was not to agree with them, bad weather and ill health took their toll on both the Lawsons and they were forced to return, and it was Mary Gilmour (she had married while in Paraguay) who again came to the rescue.

Upon their return Lawson was to find that Hannah had died some months previously, his idealised woman was gone. By 1903 their marriage had fallen apart, Bertha had filed for divorce. He attempted suicide and from this time on he was in and out of hospitals and clinics, his alcoholism worsening. Two of the women upon whom he relied throughout the last quarter of his life were his "housekeeper" Isabel Byers and Sister Alberta de Villiers MacCallum, sister-in-charge

of the Mental Hospital Darlinghurst, but even these relationships suffered with the highs and lows of his mental condition. It seems that no one, no love, no great passion could help him stay away from alcohol, the low dives he liked to haunt and the life he liked to lead but nothing could keep his genius from the people. Let fame, that all hunt after in their lives, Live register'd upon our brazen tombs, And then grace us in the disgrace



Protected Recipes

Early settlers to Australia had to learn to live off the land, or starve! Many of their recipes have been preserved for historical interest, and cannot be used today, as most of the fauna mentioned are now protected. Amongst these recipes are ways to cook bandicoot, parakeets, mallee hens, black swans, emu, kangaroo, and many other native animals. Here's two to get keen bush cooks started!

### Roast Black Swan

Choose a young bird and stuff and roast as you would a goose. Pork sausage meat is the best stuffing. Truss like a goose, brush with lemon juice, cover the breast with rashers of bacon and roast for two hours in a moderate oven. When nearly done, remove rashers, dredge with flour and baste with melted butter or bacon fat till crisp and brown. Serve with apple sauce and with stewed red cabbage. A good sized bird should be enough for eight persons.

### Sturt's Hot Pot

Slice the top off a pumpkin and hollow out the inside. Fill the shell with joints of possum, kangaroo or other meats and replace the lid. Bury the pumpkin in a bed of hot coals and cook till
