If it ain't broke

What is Bush Poetry? Perhaps the dictionary will give us an answer? Many people quote it when trying to prove some point or other. But is the dictionary a worthy reference? Is it always 100% accurate? Do the learned people who compile it always get it right? Each time? Every time? Remember it is not necessarily so, just because it is written.

We can search far and wide for answers, but in the end must collectively decide for ourselves what Bush Poetry is to us. No outside reference can be completely satisfactory. So what is it? It was agreed some time back that **our** definition of Bush Poetry is --

- "Poetry with good rhyme and metre written by:
- (a) an Australian;
- (b) about Australia, her people, places and things."

Whoever formulated that, was very wise. This straight forward, uncomplicated definition clearly says it all. It includes all Australians and Australian related subjects --yesterday, today and tomorrow. Our art form truly belongs to all of us. It reflects who we are, what we are, where we came from, where we are going and so on. Australian Bush Poetry is folk poetry at it's best.

Bush Poetry comes from many sources and we are poorer if we make the mistake of eliminating any of them for any reason. Just as Bush Poetry has many origins, so too do we have many different types of members. To name a few, we have, for instance;

- ♦ Members who write poetry and can't (or prefer not to) perform:
- ♦ Members who perform and can't (or prefer not too) write poetry:
- Members who prefer traditional and/or contemporary poetry:
- Members who prefer some of the above or the lot:
- ♦ Members who do none of the above (including audiences, supporters and organisers):

Is one type of member more important than the other? Unlikely! Like members of a family, we need and respect them all. So if one who write poetry likes to class himself/herself as a poet, so be it. There is no call to be pedantic about it and deny the same courtesy to another. Say, one who likes to perform good poetry calling him/herself a poet too. Shouldn't that apply even if the poetry was written by someone else? We really don't need petty status or semantics getting in our way causing unnecessary rifts and divisions. (By the way, contrary to what is sometimes claimed, performance is much more than just the mere ability to remember words).

Of course the *status quo* should be challenged, questioned and pushed to the limit. If it is found lacking, changes should be made. But change for the sake of change serves no purpose. Of course we can always look at what's going on and see room for improvement. But are things so wrong with Bush Poetry that we should change our whole approach? Or should we heed the advice in this joke?

If it ain't baroque - don't fix it!

PORT FAIRY FOLK FESTIVAL

The ABPA was well and truly represented at the 25th. Port Fairy Folk Festival with Neil McArthur and Frank Daniel holding fort over two of the early morning breakfasts.

Both unique in their styles, the combination of these two characters gave audiences more than their monies worth in verse and story. Humour was rife, there was never a dull moment as the carefully scripted performances led audience members from one situation to another. From days at school to the latest escapades in shopping marts, from Neil's dedication to his beloved Grandfather to Frank's over religious aunt Martha, unbelieving audiences were left in amazement as to what was fact and what was fiction. After all, only half the lies Frank tells are the truth and Neil has never been known to tell a lie.

Port Fairy Folk Festival has achieved an international status and national acclaim as one of the country's best known and most successful music festivals. All tickets for this festival are sold by a mailing system and following the mail out in early November, an avalanche of mail was returned with all tickets being sold in just over one day on a first-in first-served basis.

Children are specially catered for in non stop performances in the Big Top with jugglers, clowns, and a wide variety of performers.

Non stop performances in the five main stage areas kept over twelve thousand visitors entertained with International and local artists.


*URANGA POETS BIRTHDAY BASH

"JACK DRAKE" - NATIONAL BUSH POET OF THE YEAR

The first ever National Bush Poet of the Year Awards was successfully conducted on Friday 30th March at the ANA Hotel in Sydney.

An original idea of Mr. Ross Wall of Off the Wall Entertainment, in conjunction with Asthma NSW, the Australian Women's Weekly and in affiliation with the ABPA Inc. the challenge was set to find not only a writer, but a writer-performer, of Australian Bush Poetry.

In celebrating the Centenary of Federation Asthma NSW and The Australian Women's Weekly thought it time to acknowledge the traditional values and rich cultural identity of our nation - with one of the few uniquely Australian art forms being bush poetry.

With the growing popularity of bush poetry, Asthma NSW believed poets needed an avenue to share their words, and so this award was conceived.

Like bush poetry, asthma is particularly Australian - we have one of the highest incidences of the illness in the world. Asthma NSW provides vital information about managing asthma and believes being associated with a high-profile award can only help raise awareness.

Open to all aspiring bush poets, the award called for traditional styled rhyming bush verse.

Seven hundred and fifty submissions were made with each entry requiring a recorded reading of the poem by the author.

From these entries, a representative panel selected five finalists who were flown to Sydney to be adjudged at a fund raising dinner.

A second panel of judges, made up of Dr. Jonathon King, Mr. Peter Fenton and Mr. Frank Daniel took on the laborious task of selecting the overall winner in a very tough contest, with allowances being to be made for quality of content, delivery, presentation and audience appeal - notwithstanding, humour against serious poetry.

After long deliberation, the winning trophy with a cheque for \$5,000.00 were presented by Smoky Dawson to Jack Drake of Stanthorpe for his rousing performance of "The Cattle Dog's Revenge".

The other finalist, in order of appearance were, Carolyn Eldridge-Alfonzetti of Sydney ("The Ballad of Rosie McGreer"), Bill Kearns of Grafton NSW ("Heroes Happen"), Peter Thomas of Mt. Martha Vic. ("Beneath the Faded Word") and Grahame Watt of Kyabram Vic. ("Getting Andy's Wool Off").
