

The Golden Damper for the Traditional Section was won by that hard-to-beat Roderick Williams, reciting Paterson's In the Droving Days. Garry Lowe came in second again with Bobby Miller's Raymond, and third was Gabby Colquhoun with a hilarious rendition of The Ballad of Pedalling Pete.

In the past I have commented on the continued popularity of the old traditional poets in our competition. But this year it was "Move over



It has been a rather hectic year for both the Secretary and myself dealing with matters continually arising. Many letters emails and faxes come to hand requesting information about our association, Public Liability Insurance, advice on conducting festivals, competitions and membership.

During the year we also conducted four additional meetings via means of the internet or telephone, regarding advertising, rule changes, state representation, State and National Titles, and so on. These were referred to during the course of the AGM in January 2005.

We were saddened by the loss of an old stalwart in the death of Bill Glasson in December. Bill turned eighty earlier last year.

Our deepest sympathy goes out to Carol Heuchan for the loss of her son in New Zealand, and to Ed Parmenter whose mother passed away in October.

The lack of support by members for the selling of the ABPA Inc Annuals saw it's demise in 2004, with a motion on the books to produce it once every five years.

Thanks to Ron Selby for the splendid efforts he put in to publishing the ABPA Annuals over ten years. Approximately 900 annuals are still available for purchase.

In general, reports from the different states that conducted bush poetry titles in 2004 were good. Lot's of good feedback has come from them all allowing further consideration for the ABPA book of Rules which I hope will be accepted for publishing early in 2005.

I'm pleased to report that Terry Regan of Blaxland NSW is now on the road to better health since his accident some months ago, and that the neurosurgeon doesn't want to see him any more, and with continual physio and hydrotherapy he should be back around the festivals before too long.

I'd like to thank the outgoing committee for their support this year and wish them and the incoming committee and all members of the association a healthy and happy 2005.

Performers that year were Marco Gliori, Bobby Miller, John Philipson, Marion Fitzgerald, Murray Hartin, Gertrude Skinner, Charlee Marshall, Col Newsome and Blue the Shearer.

It ran for 4 days in 1992 and by the last day the little bar-room was filled to capacity with eager poetry fans.

In 1993 June Smythe opened the Goonoo Goonoo Room to the poets where she also served breakfast for the audience - hence the first real Bush Poets Breakfast in Tamworth

FAREWELL BILL GLASSON

Bill Glasson passed away after a long battle with illness that he fought with the loving support of wife Del and his family. Bill passed away 3rd December and was buried on 8th December in Toowoomba. A former winner of The Bronze Swagman Award in 1979. Bill was a rather late starter on the performance scene, but instantly made many friends and admirers due to his amiable character, his genuine interest in meeting other people and hearing their stories, and a rustic voice that presented very well on stage. I had the distinct pleasure of assisting Bill in recording his first and only album just a year or so before he passed away. The album is a fantastic collection intriguing renditions that swallow you up in a real Bush atmosphere. The album is complimented by comforting country sound effects includes a beautiful performance of one of Bill's poems by Carmel Dunn titled 'Only Ten Miles To Go' which is a 'haunting' story that may well have depicted many of the emotions involved in Bill's last days. Bill was well aware when recording his album that his health was poor, so the poems he recorded at Righttrack Studios Yangan, offer us an insight to the poems he himself was drawn to the most. Notice of motion

At the next general meeting, I intend to move the following motion.

That the current rule that limits the awarding of the title "State Champion" to residents of the state in which the Championships are being held, be rescinded and the following rule be applied.

That State Championships be open to all competitors irrespective of their State of residence.

My reasons are as follows:

We, the Bush Poets of Australia are a close-knit group of people who share common interests.

The fellowship enjoyed by our members at all of our poetry gatherings is unequalled in any other group of which I have been associated with.

When we plan a festival or

gathering of poets, we look forward to meeting old friends and enjoying their company.

When we restrict our competition to only state based competitors, many people, despite the fact that they can still compete for section prizes, decide that the long trip is unwarranted.

If a poet lives in Coolangatta, he or she is eligible to be crowned Queensland State Champion. If he or she lives in Tweed Heads, they cannot. If a poet lives in Wodonga he or she can be crowned Victorian State Champion. If they live in Albury, they cannot.

I understand that there are other valid reasons for leaving the situation as it is, but I feel that a fresh motion on the subject may allow some further discussion.

Winners in the 2005 Australian Bush Laureate Awards were announced before a capacity audience in the Tamworth Town Hall on Tuesday 18th Jan.

In Book of the Year, the winner was Poems Of Bob Miller The Larrikin by Bob Miller (published by Saddlesaw Productions for Sandy Miller).

In Book of the Year, Original Verse, the winner was Poems Of Bob Miller The Larrikin by Bob Miller (published by Saddlesaw Productions for Sandy Miller).

In Album of the Year, the winner was On The Road Again by Ray Essery (Restless Music, produced by Roger Ilott).

In Single Recorded Performance of the Year, the winner was Not Gone by Janine Haig (from the Janine Haig The Eulo Poet album, Janine Haig Recording J Haig/M Haig).

Winner of the Judith Hosier Heritage Award (named in honour of Australian Bush Laureate Awards

founder) was Kelly Dixon, a long time writer of bush ballads.

This was the 10th anniversary year of the Australian Bush Laureate Awards which were instigated in 1996 to recognise excellence in published and recorded Australian bush poetry.

Winners receive an attractive, finely crafted sculpture of a pen in the shape of a gum leaf giving the trophy the name "the Golden Gumleaf".

The gala Awards presentation in Tamworth featured performances by Beccy Cole, Travis Collins, Kelly Dixon, Pat Drummond, Ray Essery, Shirley Friend, Jim Haynes, Glenn Jones, Paddy Ryan and Brendon Walmsley.

ciation have increased this year with an operating surplus of \$4,436 to the sum of \$19,946.00. This indicates a gain of \$1361.00 over the previous year's surplus.

In the receipts membership fees remain basically the same along with book sales. Badge sales have slipped, probably due to the new item interest in 2003. Members insurance payments decreased by \$890.

On the payments side while the overall income is down on 2003 by \$1,234.00 outgoings have also decreased by \$2,596. Public Liability Insurance costs decreased by \$991. Postage and stationery costs also decreased by \$1,412, and the cost of newsletters \$347. In conclusion the strong financial position of the Association reflects enthusiasm in both the members

and committee.

ANUAL GENERAL MEETING 22nd January, 2005

Around 30 members attended the Associations meeting held at ST EDWARDS HALL, HILLVUE ST., TAMWORTH with apologies from a further 10 members.

Special Meeting opened 2.16 p.m. A member brought to the attention of the Sec. by email on 29th April, 2004 that an anomaly may have existed in respect of the registration in NSW and the adoption of the NSW Model Rules by the ABPA. Legal advice was sought and also the Office of Fair Trade, Bathurst was contacted. The advice obtained from the Solicitor suggested that the A.B.P.A should have conducted an extra-ordinary meeting to adopt the Model Rules. However, a Special General Meeting prior to the AGM. should correct the situation. The Fair Trade Dept. were con-

tacted at Bathurst and an Officer advised that the proposal to ratify adoption of Model Rules with amendments at the next AGM is reasonable in the circumstances. (Sgnd) Bernadette Denman, 3.6.04. Motion to formally adopt the Model Rules for Incorporated Associations under the Associations Incorporation Act 1984, including amendments carried at the 2004 A.G.M. (m) E. Parmenter. 2nd D. My shearing days are over, though I never was a gun: I could always count my twenty at the end of every run. I used the old Trade Union shears, and the blades were running full As I shoved them to the knockers and I pushed away the wool.

I shore at Goorianawa and never got the sack; From Breeza out to Comprador I always could go back; But though I am a truthful man I find, when in a bar, That my tally's always doubled but -- I never call for tar!

Now shearing on the Western Plains, where the fleece is full of sand And clover-burr and cork-screw grass, is the place to try your hand; For the sheep are tough and wiry where they feed on the Mitchell grass, And every second one of them is close to the 'cobbler' class;

And a pen chocked full of 'cobblers' is a shearer's dream of hell, And loud and lurid are their words when they catch one on the bell: But when we're pouring down the grog you'll hear no call for tar, For the shearer never cuts them -- when he's shearing in a bar!

At Louth I got the bell-sheep, a wrinkly tough-wooled brute, Who never stopped his kicking till I tossed him down the 'chute. Though my wrist was aching badly, I fought him all the way: I couldn't afford to miss a blow -- I must earn my pound a day;

So when I took a strip of skin, I would hide it with my knee--Gently turn the sheep around so the right bower couldn't see, Then try to catch the rousy's eye, and softly whisper, "Tar"; But it never seems to happen -- when I'm shearing in a bar!

I shore away the belly-wool, and trimmed the crutch and hocks, Then opened up along the neck, while the rousy swept the locks. Then smartly swung the sheep around, and dumped him on his rear-Two blows to chip away the wig -- (I also took an ear!)

Then down around the shoulder and the blades were opened wide, As I drove them on the long blow and down the whipping side; And when I tossed him down the 'chute he was nearly black with tar But it never seems to happen -- when I'm shearing in a bar!

Now when the season's ended and my grandsons all come back In their Vanguards and their Holdens -- I was always 'on the track' --They come and take me into town to fill me up with beer, And I sit on a corner-stool and listen to them shear:

There's not a bit of difference! It must make the angels weep,
To hear a mob of shearers in a bar-room shearing sheep;
The sheep go rattling down the race and there's never a call for tar,
For they still don't seem to cut them -- when they're shearing in the bar!

Then memories come crowding and they roll away the years, And my hands begin to tighten and they seem to feel the shears: I want to tell them of the sheds, of sheds where I have shorn, Full fifty years, or maybe more, before the boys were born.

I want to speak of Yarragreen, Dunlop or Wingadee, But the beer has started working and I find I cannot see. So I'd better not start shearing -- I'd be bound to call for tar; Then be treated like a blackleg -- when I'm shearing in a bar!

MILES AHEAD

The Miles (Qld) Bush Poetry Group was formed in 1999 with five Bush Poets and two Country Music vocalists. The contrasting mixture of bush poetry and song goes a long way with the show they've created and present to Tourists, especially Coach Travellers, on an almost weekly basis. In 2004 the group entertained forty-three times.

Although they come from Guluguba (yes, there is such a place) between Miles and Wandoan, the venue for their performances is the Miles Tourist Bus Stop where four buses stop each Friday and the two hour show gets under way with sometimes an added 'skit' thrown in.

Busking is the main stay financially and the group finds the tourists to be very generous.

Many of the visitors are from overseas and find it almost unbelievable to come across such a group and, not having seen anything like it in their lives, naturally enough, have to record the show with their video cameras.

Three of the group, 'The Condamine Kid', 'Banjo' Maloney and 'The Wattle Bender' (Ray Wright) competed at the Waltzing Matilda Festival in Winton in June 2004 and were most impressed with their first outing away from home.

He served in the Royal Navy Fleet Air Arm during WWII, later migrating to Australia in 1951 where he worked with earth moving machinery before moving on to Power Stations and Oil Refineries.

Jim started his own engineering business in 1967 becoming well established. It was a new life and he still misses it today.


