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VALE JUDITH HOSIER

Members of the Australian Bush Poets Association Inc. were shocked to hear of the untimely passing of Judith Hosier in Brisbane on 11th February.

Judith was born in 1937 in western Queensland and lived and loved the outback and its people to her fullest.

She was one of the nation's grandest ladies of the bush with a pioneering spirit and a determination to succeed.

The death of her young husband saw Judith carry on with her rural pursuits for a number of years before relocating to Brisbane with her two young daughters.

Judith was one of the first to make a move when the then proposed Australian Stockmans Hall of Fame and Heritage Centre was in its infancy. Judith became an Oral Historian for the HOF and for many years in her own-time and at her own expense, toured the outback interviewing our dying race of outback characters, drovers, stockmen, descendants of former camel drivers, property managers and owners, ringers and musterers in an attempt to preserve just one more part of the Nation's history.

To date there are 276 Oral Histories recorded at the HOF, and Judith Hosier was responsible for no less than 240 of them.

In 1989 Judith became the 'Tour Manager' ushering a group of American Performers, Cowboy singers and poets who were here as guests of the Hall of Fame, from Melbourne to Longreach. The token Aussie performer on this tour was none other than Jim Haynes.

The resurgence of Australian music, song and verse as entertainment saw Judith enter yet another field, furthering the cause of our Aussie Bush-Traditions as entertainment. Giving freely and unselfishly helping others, Judith started the Quartpot Gatherings in Brisbane and, with the assistance of her good friend Gabby Hamdad, a first hand attempt at encouraging aspiring bush entertainers was made.

In 1996 Judith was again instrumental in establishing the Golden Gumleaf Bush Laureate Awards to further the professionalism of our literary and performing traditions.

These Awards have become, in that short time, the verse equivalent of The Golden Guitar Awards - and will surely become Judith's lasting legacy to the continuation of that wonderful Australian Bush Heritage she loved so much.

It is a mark of the success of Judith's vision that the awards received over 70 entries last year with the quality and quantity of entries improving each year.

There were no falsehoods about Judith. She simply got stuck in and made the difference in areas where she believed in something.

She leaves a legacy in her public life of dignity and efficiency and, above all, a love of the Australian Bush Traditions. It is a legacy of high standards - high standards achieved and high standards expected.

Judith possessed an unflagging energy and in recent years her recurring bouts of Ross River Fever left her frustrated as she felt she couldn't work at full speed to her own high standards. 'We're not doing it if we are not doing it properly' were her words. She was a perfectionist.

In typical outback fashion, and in a way Judith would have understood and appreciated, long time friend and great Australian, Ted Egan found these words ...

To Judith

She stood so tall and never missed a thing. Always gracious, elegant, she never failed to bring both wisdom and compassion to all she ever met, and we will not forget that Judith was a woman we were priveledged to know as typically Australian as Clancy of the Overflow.

She'd seen too much sadness
she never laughed enough
But when she smiled
it mattered.
You knew she came from
stronger stuff
than most of us who knew her
this woman of the west
so farewell to you, our Judith
may you know eternal rest.

Presidents Report

It is with deep sadness we note the passingof Judith Hosier last month. Judith was a fine lady and the backbone behind innumerable ventures to the benefit of the Australian culture. She was involved in the Stockmans Hall of Fame at Longreach. The backbone behind The Kiosk, in Brisbane, and along with many noted poets the main driving force behind the Poets Breakfast and the Fireside Festival at the Longyard Hotel, Tamworth. She was one of the main instigators who started the Wall of Fame at the Longvard and also the Golden Gumleaf Award that so many poets in the past have benefited from. Her foresight for the need of these awards is now history. The need to recognise the talents of past and many future poets, so that future generations will be aware of these talents, can be credited to the stamina, drive and dreams of Judith Hosier. May she always be remembered as the Mother of Bush

Again last month we had the question of 'Who Judges the Judges'. It is reasonable to understand the need for a uniform standard of judging right across the board in poetry competitions. But we are of the human race, with all our diverse feelings, conceptions, emotions and variable ideas, are as different as the poetry of to-day and the poetry of Paterson and Lawson's time. Who among us can qualify as being able to set down a set of rules to please every poet?

I, for one, as being both a competitor and a judge at various events, have asked the question many times. There have been many times when Joe Blow has won a section when I have thought that there had been two or three competitors who, in my opinion, far out-performed Joe Blow but didn't even reach the finals.

Does the content of a poem make a difference to the judge? For instance would a poem about, say, fishing or golf be even considered above a poem about shearing or bushrangers or drovers. As yesteryears poet wrote about their life and times, to-days poets are writing about to-day. The children of to-days events at times far outweigh some of the more seasoned performers and in a few years they may write about space travel or galactic drug house in the sky.

Personally I believe that the total entertainment value of a poem and a performance, far outweighs the subject or the content of the poem. I'm not for one minute disputing the fine renditions and performances of the past masters and such, but to-days poet and todays public are there to be entertained.

I doubt that one poet or one judge could deny the great entertainment value of the performance of Murray Hartin's 'Turbulence' at Tamworth where the audience almost brought the tent down with it's thunderous applause. Recently there have been some fantastic renditions of C.J. Dennis' work and superbly performed by two or three noted poets. Also a very heart rending performance of Paterson's 'Lost' by one of our outstanding young ladies. You could have heard the proverbial pin drop in the audience during her performance.

So it is not so much as 'Who Judges the Judges' but rather who can abide by the judges decision on who they have chosen as the final winners. Judges are chosen for their ability and their commitment to poetry and they are handling a very difficult job to the best of their ability.

HATS OFF TO HENRY Henry Lawson Heritage Celebration

The Henry Lawson Society is holding its annual poetry competition at the "Ten Dollar Town" of Gulgong NSW. Yes, Gulgong, the town on our old ten dollar note: and we invite you to come along and help us celebrate the Henry Lawson Heritage Celebration held from 11th to 14th June, 1999.

As usual, the prestigious Leonard Teale Memorial Performance Poetry Award has been scheduled as a highlight of the weekend. Entries should be recorded on a cassette tape and be a poem about an Australian Subject, by the entrant or a poet of their choice. Performance time must not exceed 5 minutes and the tape, which must be recorded by the entrant, must be accompanied by a typed-copy of the poem, using only one side of the paper and an entry fee of \$10.00. Entries will not be returned.

Ten finalists will be chosen and final judging will

take place on Sunday 6th June by live performance before judges at the Prince of Wales Opera House, Gulgong.

Entries close on 14th April, so don't be late. Just to get-your attention, the organisers are offering a first prize of \$1,000 plus a Loaded Dog figurine, 2nd prize of \$400 and 3rd prize of \$200.

Throughout the weekend many other festival activities are planned and the town also offers a fine display of memorabilia at the Henry Lawson Centre. The purpose of this centre is to collect, preserve, research and exhibit those objects which will enable it to illustrate the literary works of Henry Lawson, his family, associated characters and places.

NATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL: A FEAST OF BUSH POETRY - Canberra at Easter 1st - 5th April, 1999

Once again, the National Folk Festival, will feature Bush Poetry as part of its Spoken Word Program. Featured poetry performers this year include Blue the Shearer, Campbell the Swaggie, Joe the Poet (Frank Daniel), Kathielyn Job, Dick Warwick - American Cowboy Poet, Mark Feldman, Living Poets, Stand Up Poets, Edwina Blush, Thalia and Alan Musgrove, Bob Rummery, Roger Montgomery and Yuri the Storyteller.

There will, as always, be a friendly Poets Breakfast every morning, where everyone - novice and professional alike - is welcome to take their turn. And for the best performance at the Poets Breakfasts there is the coveted Reciters Award, now in its sixteenth year.

The prestigious Reciters Award, crafted by Terry Gleeson in Australian Ironbark, is easily the longest standing award in the Australian Bush Poetry arena, having been awarded at the Festival every year since 1983. this year it will be judged by last year's winner, Mark Feldman of Queensland.

The festival also is host to the phenomenally popular annual World Poetry Debate. This year teams from Western Australia, our featured State, will debate against 'The Rest of the World on the "Poetry is Better Than Sex". Moderated by Bernard Boland, the Debate is now easily the highlight of the whole Festival. For the past two years they have been quening up for hours to get in, and the venue has been

bursting at the seams. So be early!

There also will be a range of poetry and story-telling concerts and workshops, including a rare performance of Blue the Shearer's play "Two Thousand Six Hundred Days.". Those of you who witnessed Blue's double back flip with pike and chair at the Festival several years back will not want to miss this unique event!

And, of course, in the unlikely event you want a break from the poets and storytellers, there will be over a thousand singers, musicians and dancers, from Australia and around the world-to entertain you.

Rather than pay, as at Tamworth, for each event separately, and have to drive around town from venue to venue, at the National Folk Festival everything happens on the one secure site (the Canberra Showgrounds) and once you pay to enter all events are free.

The Festival has some 14 venues running simultaneously, and all within walking distance. There is also a dedicated daytime Children's Festival, as well as onsite camping, child-minding and a host of delightful foods and craft stalls.

If you pre-book for the Festival before 26th March, you can save up to 20% on the price of your ticket. Adult season prices range from \$90.00, adult pre paid from \$25.00 per day. Season camping starts at \$25.00 per adult unpowered. Children under 5 years are admitted free.

ZITA HOME FROM ELKO

The 1998 Australian Bush Poetry Champion, Zita Horton, has just returned from Elko, Nevada. Her trip to the Cowboy Poetry Gathering was her prize for winning the 1998 Championships, held in Winton last April. Zita would particularly like to thank the sponsors QANTAS and Vision Winton, and says about her trip -

"It was such a tremendous experience! I had the privilege of performing with some very experienced and well-known poets and singers, and in front of much bigger audiences than I've ever envisaged. The Elko Gathering attracts people from all over the United States, and the organisers, The Western Folklife Center, estimated over 9,000 visitors this time. I performed 6 times in various venues, as well as school presentations. One performance was sent live over the internet! The American audiences are very receptive to Australian Bush Poetry, and were very warm and friendly to me as a performer. They certainly remembered Australian poets who had gone there in the previous years, and there were many expressions of regret that the current Male Champion, Milton Taylor, was unable to attend. I would certainly encourage anyone considering going to the Waltzing Matilda Bush Poetry Championships in Winton over the ANZAC Day long week-end. Go! you might spend next January in the snow at Elko!"

Carmel Randle, multi-award winning Bush Poet, also attended the Elko Gathering. She had planned to go after hearing of Zita's win last April, and auditioned for several Cowboy Poetry Gatherings in the USA. She was accepted as a performer at Denver, Colorado, and at Lewiston, Idaho, as well as the Elko Gathering. Her performances were greeted with much acclaim and she has had many pressing invitations for her return next year.

Brisbane poet, Anita Hendry, was working at Lake Tahoe (5 hours drive away) and came over for the Gathering. She was able to perform at two of the open mike sessions.

WOODFORD ... Where to begin?? by Jan Mackay

I am staring at the blank page wondering just were to start ... to write some sort of report about this year's Woodford Folk Festival, the task shouldn't be that daunting ... dissect out and sketch out details of poetic events, add names of those poets in attendance ... sounds quite straight forward really. And yet... And yet...

Perhaps I'm hesitating because I feel myself totally unequal to the task of portraying something so wide and wonderful as Woodford is. The food and film festivals, the workshops, the music, the dance, the spectacle, the people.

The spoken word is well and truly embedded in the fabric of the festival and ranges broadly from seasoned performances from poets like Mark Both, Marco Gliori, Murray Hartin and Shirley Friend providing a host of first-time opportunities. For many, the most memorable bit of their festival was not the "big name" acts which graced the large stages but rather the fact that they found what it took to get up at a Poets Breakfast. We should never forget this. The styles of poetry are quite diverse ... we truly do get a little chance to view the world not only from a lot of different perspectives but also through a host of methods and styles.

As previously, many of the poets camped in the luxury of Poets Hill(ton), a comfortable camp set up by Jacqueline Bridle, the Spoken Word co-ordinator. From here they went their various ways ... to the breakfasts, the popular comedy sessions in the Guinness-Bar with comedians-like S: Sorrenson, Davishti, Arch Bishop and Alan Glover, and poets like Mark Feldman and Wally finch, to the workshops, to MC or just to immerse themselves in the festival that enveloped them.

The North Pine Bush Poets came and performed well at the Sitting Duck Cafe. Arcadia Flynn (who emerged from her poetic chrysalis at Woodford just a few years back) launched her first book amid much hilarity. The Poets Brawl, which I jointly hosted for the past few years, was again popular with this year's winner being Cathoel Jorss presenting an impeccably timed piece that one minute brawlers dream of. The Dead Poets society honoured the works of a number of poets no longer with us. Shirleyand I had our usual ball in the children's festival as the kids kept us entertained with their poetry (and jokes) and "virgin" poets at the breakfasts received a standing ovation.

The Festival is a melting pot of inspiration and opportunity. I see it as a time of re-creation in the true sense ... of reflecting, learning and growing. As someone who first found himself inexplicably in front of a microphone not all that many years ago, I find that the Woodford festival never fails to enrich both my life and my performance.

In the familiar, ageless glow of candlelight, Russian-born Master Storyteller Yuri captivates his audiences by creating word-images that bind the listener to the magic of the classic folktale. Yuri, the archetypal village storyteller is renowned throughout the Australian Folk World. He was recently recorded by the National Library in Canberra so that his revered art form be preserved in the National Archive. He is an acclaimed veteran and his appearances have included World Expo 1988, National Folk festivals and Public broadcasts.

Yuri, currently can be seen appearing as part of "Seanchas" (shann ik as), a Story Theatre of golden songs, storytelling and bewitching dances which weave a theatre of imagination which harks back to traditional village forms and legends. Evocative and inspirational, using a mixture of song, verse, story and dance to achieve a unified theatrical experience. The name "Seanchas" tells of the people but it does little to prepare you for the impact - the magic of the stories, the power of the songs or the elegance of the dance.

Amongst Yuri's Stories can be heard "The Green Lady of Newton Castle", a traditional story from Scotland which is a haunting and pensive tale that captures all and whose meaning cannot be translated in proasic words.

Marian and I would very much like to thank you, and your magazine for all the great publicity we received for our Tamworth stint with our Cattle Camp Kitchen and associated shows, which included enthusiastic performances by 15 bush poets and 37 singers and musos.

Regrettably, the little legend, Bobby Miller was not well enough to perform, but I did put him on stage to be introduced to a very receptive crowd. We had the use of what was claimed to be the best sound system in Tamworth, plus two top sound men, provided by courtesy of the Toyota Aust. Corp., and this alone was quite a plus for our movement. At least audiences were able to hear every word or instrument.

The article you published in the magazine prior to Tamworth certainly let many people know about our plans for the event we staged, and we both thank you sincerely for that. I am afraid I did have too much to do in the end, and a couple of mistakes were made, and one or two poets and singers were not able to be included in the shows. This was simply because I or one of my helpers made an error and the names were lost in the system. For that I am really sorry, because I understand how upsetting such a thing can be to a performer.

Some good news for the bush poetry movement can

now be made public. Leading publishing house Pan-MacMillan Aust: have plans well advanced for publishing an anthology of Australian and contemporary bush verse, which will include the work of some thirty poets, a lot of whom are members of your Association. Bruce Simpson, Bob Magor, Colin Munro of ABC Radio and myself have been involved with this exciting project for some twelve months or so now and we are in possession of written evidence of the plan to proceed very soon. A meeting between all named is to be held in Sydney, March 25 next, when we actually sign the publishing contract with MacMillan. It is hoped to release the book, titled "Bush Poets of the Millennium" on Australia Day 2000.

The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria has been very much the mover and shaker behind this deal, which can only do great things for the bush poetry section of our national culture.

We all must mourn the loss of a stalwart, in the late Judith-Hosier, whom we shall miss greatly for a long time, and at the same time, be grateful to have emerge another ally, Jamie Aitkin, the General Manager of the RASV, and an ardent supporter of our style of poetry, and the man behind the deal with MacMillan.

Lastly, anyone who hasn't seen Ken Hood perform should try to. He is in my opinion, really someone special, and a thoroughly nice man as well.
