

# BRIAN GALE

Brian Gale was born and raised in a farming community in the small district of Kudardup in the South-West of Western Australia. He left home at the age of twelve for high school in Bunbury, then a friendly town of 8,000 people. Hairdressing, cycling, badminton and boxing took up the next few years of his life, even during a term of three years Army service. But the love of the open life from his childhood years was foremost, and he spent many years pine logging. It was during this time that he started writing poetry. The first of his poem "The Battle with the Grey" was an epitaph written after a stand-up fight with a kangaroo over possession of a waterhole. Camping in the bush for many years on a worksite has given inspiration for much of Brian's verse. He came 2<sup>nd</sup> in Australia in the 'Gone Bush' competition in 1994 with his poem 'Back to the River', and has also been published in the 1994 Bronze Swagman Book of Verse.



Brian attended the Cowboy Poets Gathering in Pincher Creek, Alberta Canada in 1995 and 1999, where he cycled the Rockies each time, and Montana as well in 1999 as far as Custers Battlefield and back. He cycled 4,000 kms in 3 months. During these visits, he made fried with the Shuswaf Indians and camped with them on different occasions. He describes them as "great people with a great sense of humour". Brian has self published two books and also produced three cassettes of his poetry.

What's your dream Job?

I reckon I had it for 25 years. I got out of hairdressing and society and went pine logging. Camping in the bush, on the job in a camper away from all life's cares. Singing to the chain saw, and poetry writing any time.

What's your least favourite food? Tripe. I remember vividly boarding in my teens. Midday Saturday was tripe day, that was always my slowest ride home.

Which three people would you invite to dinner?

Johnny Cash, Slim Dusty, and Susan Aglukark, an Inuit lady from Canada. I love the way these people tell stories in their songs and have been great influences in my life.

What one item would you want if you were stranded on a deserted island?

Someone to share it with. Preferably of the opposite sex.

What would you do if you had \$1,000,000?

Share it. Money is nice, but can only bring happiness if used wisely and to help others.

What's your favourite movie?

Jim Thorpe - All American (A.k.a. Man of Bronze). The legendary Pentathlon and Decathlon winner in 1912. Closely followed by "Crazy Horse" and "Geronimo". Legends in a lifetime.

What song do you never want to hear again?

I'm not sure of their names, but they're all on Hot F.M.

What did you have for breakfast this morning?

Health food – an apple, toast, coffee, and of course – Weeties. A proven stayer in the bush.

#### REVIEW:

"Closer to the Heart" (Book)
This slim volume of poetry contains
22 poems by West Australian poet
Brian Gale, and includes 2 poems
written by a young friend, Renae
Bessell, aged 11.

Brian is a strong advocate for the bush and the simple way of life, whether that is life in Australia, or in the USA or Canada. His poetry is uncomplicated and clear in its expression of pleasure in the great outdoors and 'the sun on your back and the wind in your hair'. He tells humorous tales of shearing and dogs and chooks, interspersed with reflections on the past and the rapid passage of time. His humble and sincere tribute "The Anzacs" touches a subject dear to the heart of many Australians.

As though in keeping with the uncomplicated style of his writing, Brian's poetry has a good natural rhythm. However, it does stray from a regular beat here and there, and is possibly more suited to performance than reading.

Perhaps the most engaging segment of Brian's book is the four poems written about historical events in the history of the Native Americans. These are a curious contribution from an Australian bush poet, and are obviously events that have deeply touched this writer's heart.

In keeping with its title 'Closer to the Heart', this collection of poetry does express the heartfelt values and opinions of this bushman. Thanks for your reflections Brian.

Dear Jennifer

I read with interest a letter in our November issue from Corry de Haas of Helensvale, Q. Her comment, "2. Diction, Diction, Diction ..." was familiar indeed! I too have had the privilege of judging performance poetry competitions and agree with the thoughts. May I add my two cents worth?

Many problems with diction and 'difficult to hear' performances are associated with the incorrect use of the most important thing on stage (other than the performer), i.e. the MICROPHONE! Valuable competition points are often lost simply because the performance is not audible and many of these can be attributed to poor microphone technique.

Here are a few tips, which may help -

Don't cover your face with the microphone! People attend venues to see performers, which includes their face. It is the face, which shows the personality of the performer, their facial expressions and, to a large degree, conveys the meaning and feelings within the performance. It can be frustrating for the audience to see the butt of a microphone and the knuckles of the hand holding it.

The correct manners in which to hold and use a microphone so an audience can enjoy the performance to its full extent is to hold the microphone with a relaxed grip; don't strangle it. It should be held at an angle of no more than 45 degrees positioned under your bottom

lip and no closer than about 3 centimetres to your face.

The easiest way to achieve this position is to support the microphone with the thumb and then lightly hold it with four fingers, but only to the second joint, not in the palm of your hand. The line of the forearm should be down to the side with the elbow lightly tucked in to give total control.

Each venue's sound system will vary and it simply is not possible, for financial reasons, to ask for a sound technician to be available to adjust the equipment for individual performers. However, your powers of observation can offer some help by watching those who perform before you do. You can then ascertain the levels at which the system may be set in preparation for your time on stage.

Also, a few words of greeting to the audience at the commencement of your performance will often allow you to hear your voice from Dear Editor either the fold back speakers (the small speakers which often face the performer at the front of the stage) or the house speakers. This will help you determine the levels at which the venue's system is set.

By practicing and perfecting the method of passive microphone control, the performer is always in control and maintains the respect of their audience who are there to listen. Turn and the microphone turns with you, smile and the audience smiles with you.

Practice in front of a mirror and if possible record your work at home. little forward momentum. Listen to the tapes and you may well find areas of diction, microphone distortion and voice animation on which you can improve.

Correct microphone technique will enhance a performance so much you will be amazed at the effect on your confidence and overall performance plus the additional appreciative response and enjoyment from your audience.

An interviewer once asked Frank Sinatra if he played an instrument. His reply was "Yes, the microphone!" Ain't it the truth.

I hope these thoughts are of assistance and my thanks go to all those whom I have seen perform and compete over the years - I luvs yers!

#### MAN FROM SNOWY RIVER BUSH FESTIVAL FRI 6TH - SUN 8TH APRIL, 2001

The Legend of Jack Riley

Irish born Jack Riley made his home in the Kosciusko Ranges on becoming manager of the Tom Groggin cattle station in 1884 and soon acquired a reputation as a skilled horseman and stockman.

In 1890 Banjo Paterson visited Jack's high country hut and spent a night with him while Jack told the story of a ride where he daringly pursued a thoroughbred stallion on horseback through rough mountain country. That was the year that the Bulletin published 'The Man from Snowy River' the famous poem which has since become part of Australia's history.

Jack Riley is buried in Corryong cemetery and each year 'The Man From Snowy River' Bush Festival recreates the imagery of the poem with a bush gathering. There's plenty of exciting horse events - Riley's Ride simulates Jack's last days and the legendary 1914 trek from Tom Groggin to Corryong (43 rugged miles).

The 'Man From Snowy River' Challenge to find the modern 'Man' has real bush action with bareback obstacle, whiperacking, shoeing, brumby catching, and buck jumping over three spectacular days. Add to these a Street Parade, Art & Photography, Family Food Feast, a good old fashioned Bush Dance and re-enactment of Banjo's poem.

Celebrate with us at Corryong - where the myth began, the spirit of 'Banjo' and Jack Riley live on, and the Bush Poetry and Storytelling gain more popularity each year.

#### (c) Both Genders On Judging Panels

Ideally both genders should be on all Judging Panels, particularly when it is not practical to have separate Categories for Male and Female Competitors.

#### (d) Competitor status unchanged after an entry is submitted.

A competitor's competition status shall remain unchanged from what it was when any entry form was submitted irrespective of that competitor qualifying for higher category after the entry was sent.

#### (e) Closing Date

To allow organisers to publish catalogues and other tasks, a reasonable closing date could be two weeks or more before a competition.

#### (f) Late Entries

Late entries may be taken or rejected at the organisers' sole discretion.

#### (g) Entering Several Categories

Ideally Competitors should be encouraged to enter in one class only, i.e., Novice, or Intermediate, or, Open. However, Competitors may enter more than one Category at the sole discretion of the organisers. In competitions, competitors must always perform a different poem for each Category entered. This also applies for Heats and Finals. See Repeated Poems in Part 3 Section 7 (i) and Part 3 Section 7 (k)

#### (h) Entry fees

Organisers, at their discretion, may nominate appropriate entry fees to cover administration costs and raise funds.

#### (i) Deductions From The Score

#### (i) Reading

Although Competitors may read their work in some categories, unscripted performances are encouraged by automatic deductions as follows:

Novice 10 points Intermediate 20 points

Open Category competitors are expected to be able to perform without help and reading will mean a disqualification.

- (ii) Exceeding Time Limits as detailed in these guidelines will incur a penalty of 5 points for every 15 seconds or part thereof.
- (iii) Repeated Poems carry a 10 point penalty. See also Part 3 Section 7 (k)
- (iv) Bush Poetry is family style entertainment. Obscene or offensive material will be automatically disqualified and scored zero.

#### (j) Qualifying Score

A score meeting all of the following conditions is a qualifying score which elevates the competitor to the next level of competition:

- (i) a score of 80% or better of a possible total score from all judges; with
- (ii) at least 80 points from each judge; and,
- (iii) no section of the Score Sheet scored below 12 points.

This system should eliminate Novices being compelled to enter Open Competition through winning by default by being the only competitor in that Category. It also allows for elevation of deserving competitors who come second, third or even are not placed.

#### (k) Repeated Poems

Where a competitor repeats the same poem at a competition a 10 point penalty applies for each repetition. For instance, a poem performed in Novice Category and again in Intermediate or Open. This also applies to poems performed in the Heats performed again in the Finals. Although repeating a poem performed by another competitor is not preferred it carries no penalty.

#### (1) Judging Panel

- (i) Ideally all bush poetry judging should be by a panel of three ABPA approved Judges and judging by others should be discouraged.
- (ii) Judges names should appear with literature forwarded to the competitors.
- (iii) In the case of State and National Championships, names of the Judging Panel should be forwarded to the Secretary of the ABPA 3 months in advance.
- (iv) At their sole discretion, the organisers may substitute judges when unavoidable situations occur.

#### (m) Judges Decisions Are Final

Judges' decisions are final and absolutely no further discussion on the matter will be considered.

#### (n) Return of Judges' Sheets

At the sole discretion of the organisers, Judges' Score Sheets will be given to Competitors either after all results have been announced or they will be posted later. In the case of the latter a Stamped, Self Addressed envelope may be requested

#### (o) Deciding On Overall Champions

Overall Champions shall be decided as in Part 4 -Section 11 of these guidelines.

#### (p) Offensive Material

If in the majority opinion of the Organisers Executive Committee a performance is offensive and/or objectionable, the score sheet shall be deemed null andvoid. A performance must be G rated entertainment as per the FACTS Code of Practice.

#### (q) Competitors Can't Enter Lower Categories

Competitors can't enter competitions a levels lower than their qualification, e.g., a competitor qualified for Intermediate Category cannot compete in Novice Category

#### 8. Yarn Spinning

#### (a) Categories

At the discretion of the organisers any or all of the following classes may be offered to competitors either singularly or in combination:

- (i) Junior (20 to 50 Years)
- (ii) Senior (50 to 70 Years)
- (iii) Master (70 years plus)

#### (b) Not Verse

Yarn spinning is not verse. Therefore Verse must not be used.

#### (c) Not Jokes

Yarn spinning is not merely the telling of jokes.

#### (d) Time Limit

A time limit of 8 minutes shall apply for all classes.

#### (e) Gender

This competition is open to men and women.

#### (f) Performance Poetry Competition Guidelines Apply

Where applicable guidelines for Part 3 Section 7 Performance Poetry Competition shall apply.

#### Part 4 Organisation

#### 9. Conduct of Competitions

Any organisation adopting these guidelines will have ABPA approval to publish the following notation on the advertising of approaching competitions:

#### "Conducted under the Guidelines of the ABPA"

Organisations not adopting these guidelines will not be given such approval,

ABPA members can seek that notation confident in the knowledge competitions where it appears will have no unfamiliar rulings or unwelcome surprises.

#### 10. Judging Criteria

Please see Appendices 5 and 6.\*

#### 11. Criteria for Selecting Overall Winners

Overall winners shall be chosen by a total of the aggregate points from all Categories entered.

#### 12. Tie Breakers

Where equal scores occur, scrutineers shall recall the Judging Panel to vote on which competitor should win.

#### 13. Duties of the Time Keeper

To accurately time all events and by some clearly audible but reasonably subtle means signal that a time limit has been reached and repeat that signal at 15 second intervals until the competitor is finished.

#### 14. Duties of the Compere/M.C.

#### (a) Overview

To ensure smooth running of the programme and filling in silent spots between competitors while judges are deliberating. Such "filling" should not waste or add undue time to the programme.

#### (b) Presentations

Presentations are the highlight of a competition and should be made as informative and entertaining as possible:

- (i) give names of winners in reverse order, e.g., 3rd, 2nd, 1st;
- (ii) include the name of the poem performed in the announcement;
- (iii) try to choose presenters with personality.

#### 15. Duties of the Competition Co-ordinator/Manager

To ensure smooth running of all facets of the competition, people are on time, all equipment works, etc., etc.

#### 16. Duties of the Scrutineers

Collect Judges' Score Sheets, total scores, subtract deductions. Recall Judges if required for a tie breaker. Where Organisation policy permits, collate Judges Score sheets to give to competitors after awards have been presented.

#### 17. Accuracy

Accuracy of score totals is vital. Where an error is found it must be corrected even if results have already been declared and prizes distributed. Such errors must be publicly announced and the rightful winners or place getters given their correct prizes.

States are encouraged to conduct their own State Championships may conduct them under these guidelines. No arrangements have yet been made to co-ordinate State Championships with the Australian Bush Poetry Championships.

#### 19. Australian Bush Poetry Championships

The Australian Bush Poetry Association Inc. (ABPA) is the only organisation with the right to use name of "Australian Bush Poetry Championships" in which the National Champion Poets (Male and Female) are chosen.

#### 20. Tenders for Australian Bush Poetry Championships

The ABPA at its sole discretion may permit others to conduct the Australian Bush Poetry Championships and tenders for the privilege are invited annually through the pages of the ABPA monthly Newsletter.

#### 21. Cases Not Covered by These Guidelines

Cases not covered by these guidelines may be determined by the committee of the Organisers' it sees fit.


## The First Fleet



#### First Recorded Australian State Nicknames

Queenslanders - banana-landers, or banana-benders

New South Welshmen – cornstalkers, a term applied to all colonial young men and women.

Victorians – gum suckers or cabbage patchers, referring to the size of the State

South Australians – crow eaters, taken from the piping shrike in the coat of arms of that State.

West Australians – sand gropers; they in turn refer to all others as Fasterners

Tasmanians - Taswegians, Shackle Islanders, or Apple Islanders

#### Things To Know

From 'The Weekly Courier', 1 October 1914

To preserve meat in hot weather, wash over in very weak vinegar and water, and then cover with slices of raw onion and rinse meat in cold water.

To remove tar stains, rub the spot first with lard and then with soap. Leave for an hour, and then wash in hot water softened with ammonia. If traces still remain, rub with turpentine.

When making a steamed pudding put a piece of well-greased paper over the top before tying on the cloth. This will prevent the cloths from becoming greasy, and they are no trouble to wash.

A few drops of castor oil will be found most beneficial to drooping ferns. Drop the castor oil on the roots, and soak the ferns in a pail of water all night. In a week a marked improvement will be noticeable.
